**SMELLS CARRIED BY CURRENTS**  
Experiments Have Been Made to Show the Time Taken for Various Scents to Travel.

The rapid propagation of smells noticed in the open air appears due entirely to currents, since in small tubes, where currents do not exist, the rate is found to be very small. Experiments along this line were first undertaken in England and additional data have been reported in this country.

With ammonia diffusing through a tube a meter and a half long, more than two hours elapsed before the smell could be detected at the other end of the tube. Using different lengths of tubing, it was found that the time required for the diffusion of the smell was roughly proportioned to the square of the length.

Ammonia and hydrogen sulphide were used for these experiments. The presence of ammonia could be detected chemically at a point in a tube after about the same time as when the sense of smell was used

**SENDING PHOTOGRAPH BY WIRELESS**  
London.—The Daily Mail announces that an electrician, T. T. Baker, a pioneer in photo telegraphy, has completed a process for wireless photography. It is said that he has found it possible to send by wireless a photograph which is reproduced on a sensitive film some distance away from the sending set.

The newspaper prints a picture, which, it says, was transmitted by Mr. Baker from one building to another building, 100 yards away, in three minutes. It adds that the process before long may be used for the transmission of pictures over unlimited areas.

Salem.—The orphan situation in Oregon, as it relates to the farm home established about a year ago near Corvallis by the Women's Christian Temperance union of Oregon, was explained in detail at a mass meeting held in the First Methodist Episcopal church Sunday.

Medford.—There are 9 feet and 7 inches of snow at Crater lake, according to a telephone message received by Superintendent Sparrow Saturday from Pete Ord, the ranger stationed in Crater national park. This is two feet more than the depth of snow at the lake at this time last year.

Salem.—The stock of the Oregon state library consists of 196,101 volumes, exclusive of periodicals and uncatalogued books, which number more than 10,000 according to the biennial report prepared by Miss Cornelia Marvin, state librarian. The report will be filed with the governor this week.

Hillsboro.—Much of the time during the present week has been devoted to "road districting" by the county court. Several changes have been made. One new district was created, No. 63, adjoining Hillsboro on the east. It lies between Newton and Orenco and Hillsboro and Orenco. The supervisor has not as yet been named.
