When the big chief visited Oregon, he found that our chief executive puzzled him. That is not so startling. Even his own constituents find it hard to understand our Walt.

When Mr. Harding visited the Oregonian shop he dropped his hat. The compositor who picked it up now has his head so swelled he can hardly get his own lid on.

That the United States Navy will not accept men for enlistment who are given the option of joining the Navy or going to jail for commission of crime, says Lieut. Commander Daniel E. Barbey, Recruiting Officer for the Portland District. A recent case of this nature came up when Judge Barnard, of Eugene, sentenced Ernest Eller, of Couberg, to the reformatory school for passing bad checks unless he would enlist in the Navy. Lieutenant Commander Barbey wrote Judge Barnard calling his attention to the undesirability of having such men in the Navy and stated he had refused to allow Eller to enlist.

The action of Lieutenant Commander Barbey in refusing to allow a convict to enlist is in line with proper policy. It would be not only unfair to introduce to patriotic sailors as a messmate one who is marked with the brand of a criminal, but it would also be a stigma on the escutcheon of the Navy to allow within her ranks one who has so far forgotten his honor.

Exorbitant Demands

Fifteen hundred bricklayers in New York struck and tied up \$125,000,000 of construction work.

They rejected a wage offer of \$1.25 an hour up to January, 1927, and payment of bonus to the end of this year, or arbitration proposals.

A successful strike of bricklayers immediately throws out of employment plumbers, painters, plasterers, sheet-metal workers, carpenters and lathers. Then orders for material fall off and the steel mills, saw mills, manufacturing and transportation companies begin to slack up.

With prosperity staring us in the face, it is a crime against the nation for either labor unions or manufacturers to so inflate their prices that further building and development are prohibited through excessive costs.—Industrial News.

Pavement Characteristics

As the use of hard surfaced roads increases, the advantages of various paving materials becomes more manifest.

The inherent characteristics of asphalt and Portland cement are directly accountable for the difference in the physical properties of the two types of pavement which they represent.

Cement has slight adhesive qualities and the mortar formed by it after solidifying, or setting, resembles in physical properties porcelain or crockery. It is a rigid substance and very susceptible to sudden stresses, such as traffic impact.

Drop a piece of cement on a piece of glass and after it hardens it can be brushed off. Drop a piece of asphalt on the glass and it is almost impossible to remove it. The same experiment holds true in road construction.

The jar of traffic breaks the binder of cement which holds together the rock and sand in the roadway. The jar on asphaltic concrete will break through the rock in many instances instead of loosening it from the asphalt.

Due to this adhesive character and resiliency of asphalt, it is being found advantageous to save the concrete base of highways by surfacing the same with a three-inch wearing surface of asphaltic concrete, thus saving enormous sums to the taxpayers which would otherwise be lost, due to the early crystallization and destruction of the unprotected concrete surface.—Industrial News.

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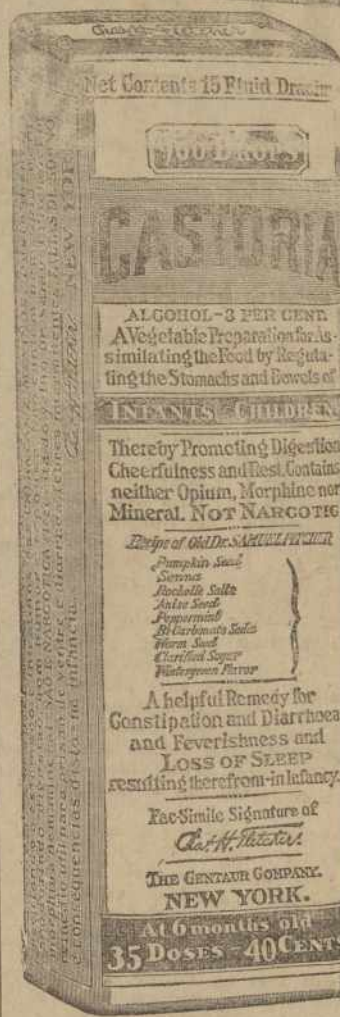
