Auto Races to Be Run at Salem

For the big automobile races to be
given on Labor Day, Sept. 3, at the
State Fair grounds, it is estimated
there will be an attendance of from
five to eight thousand.

The races are to be given for the
benefit of the Salem Hospital fund.
Efforts were recently made in Salem
to raise \$35,000, and as but a few hun-
dred are needed, it was decided to put
on auto races for the benefit of this
fund.

There is one thing assured for these
big races, and that is, the program will
begin promptly at 3 o'clock and no de-
lays will be permitted. There will be
continuous races until about 5:30
o'clock.

At 6 o'clock dinner will be served in
the Christian church restaurant on the
grounds, and this will be followed at
7:15 o'clock by a free vaudeville. Dur-
ing the races a band of 15 pieces will
play. At 9 o'clock in the evening dan-
cing will begin at the pavilion.

Nineteen of the fastest auto racers
on the Pacific coast will take part in
these races. These include the famous
Peugeot French racing car, a Duesen-
dorf special, a Baby Fontenay and a
racing Stutz. Dare-devil Clark will
race his famous "Spark Plug," winner
of third place at the Vancouver races.
It is hoped that many from Aurora
who enjoy fast racing, music and gen-
eral fun, will avail themselves of this
opportunity to combine all.

Fast, clean races are promised, and
the whole event will be given for the
benefit of the Salem Hospital fund.

Henry Thiele, who can set a table
for 270 people all at once, will be in
charge of the restaurant for the day.

With two and a half hours of auto
racing, band music during the races, a
dinner served by Henry Thiele, free
vaudeville and then dancing, a most
interesting time is promised Aurora
folks who attend the races Labor Day
at Salem.
