OREGON NEWS ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST

Brief Resume of Happenings of
the Week Collected for
Our Readers.

Highway work in Curry county is
still in progress despite the rains.

Hershal, Baker county's newest
postoffice, is doing business. S. L.
Beatty is the postmaster.

Fruit growers of Silverton are dis-
cussing plans for the operation of a
co-operative cannery at that place.

As a result of mass meeting of wo-
men of Albany, that city may have a
police matron within the near future.

The Mount Angel cannery has just
completed its record year with a busi-
ness increase over last year of 50 per
cent.

When street improvement work is
completed in Bend early in November,
35 square yards of bitulithic will have
been laid.

Taxable property in Linn county for
the year 1923 is valued at \$25,710,580,
which is \$589,170 less than last year's
valuation.

With a large attendance the third
annual East End apple show opened
at Freewater with the finest display of
fruit in history.

Marshfield has a population of 6000,
a gain of about 2000 since 1920, ac-
cording to figures compiled by takers
of the school census.

The stork played a Halloween joke
on A. S. Heath of Winchester bay,
near Reedsport, when triplets arrived
in care of Mrs. Heath.

Six persons were killed and seven
more or less seriously wounded in Ore-
gon during the deer hunting season
that closed October 31.

The 38th annual convention of the
Oregon state Sunday-school council
was held in McMinnville with an at-
tendance of 75 delegates.

Plans have been made by the Ump-
qua post of the American Legion to
make the Armistice day celebration
the biggest yet held in Douglas coun-
ty.

In the tax year which ended Oc-
tober 5 Sheriff Hurlburt's collecting
forces received from taxpayers of
Multnomah county the sum of \$14,240,
693.80.

A state-wide campaign, having as
its goal a membership of 10,000 in the
state of Oregon, is to be launched by
the American Legion, beginning Arm-
istice day.

The Beaverton city council has
awarded to the American Woodpipe
company of Tacoma the contract for
a new city water system on a bid
of \$42,911.25.

Short Bob, a full-blooded Klamath
Indian, 80 years of age, has brought
suit for divorce at Klamath Falls
against Mrs. Short Bob, 78, alleging
extreme cruelty.

Canvas back ducks are not as plenti-
ful in Lake county as in former years
because a great many lake beds are
dry and the area of most of the larger
lakes has decreased.

Registration of voters for the spe-
cial election held Tuesday totaled 333,
017, according to reports received at
the offices of the secretary of state
from various counties.

The Salem automobile tourist camp-
ing park has closed its gates for the
season. Since April 15, the date of
the opening of the park a total of 4535
machines have registered.

State tax collected from gasoline
and distillate sales in Oregon during
September aggregated \$247,500.34, ac-
cording to a report prepared by Sam
A. Koser, secretary of state.

Sherman county farmers have prac-
tically completed all fall seeding, due
to the fact that this has been one of
the most favorable seasons for the
wheat growers in several years.

The new \$80,000 national guard arm-
ory of Medford has been completed ex-
cept a few minor finishing touches,
and the tentative date for its formal
dedication has been set for November
26.

George Neuner of Roseburg, at the
request of I. H. Van Winkle, attorney
general, has left for McMinnville,
where he will conduct an investiga-
tion into the finances of Yamhill coun-
ty.

C. H. Gram, state labor commission-
er, has been requested by Salem busi-
ness men to make a survey of local
factories with a view of determining
the cause of the present cinder nul-
sance.

Ed Murphy of Knappa, 50, is in an
Astoria hospital with his pelvic bones
crushed and suffering internal in-
juries, the result of an accident at
the Big Creek Logging company's
camp.

A test of the validity of the con-
tracts of the Oregon Co-operative
Grain Growers' association is involved
in suits filed by this association
against P. L. Schamed of Grass Valley
and F. M. Lovegreen of Heppner for
alleged violation of contract.

What is declared to be the largest
buck ever brought into Pendleton was
one killed by Herman Rosenberg in
his pasture on his ranch near Hide-
away Springs. The buck weighed 300
pounds dressed.

Fred Skeen, a young rancher resid-
ing near Dorris, just over the Cali-
fornia line south of Klamath Falls,
was found dead in his bed by a neigh-
boring rancher under circumstances
indicating murder.

During the first ten months of this
year motor vehicle registrations total-
ed 162,200, as against 131,938 during
the same period in 1922, according to
a report prepared by Sam A. Koser,
secretary of state.

"Kid" Gistrap, 22, was shot and
badly wounded by deputy sheriffs and
federal agents during a raid on a
moonshine still at his home, two miles
west of Cheshire station and 20 miles
northwest of Eugene.

One of the lightest votes ever polled
in Albany was recorded in a special
school election, when less than 50
people cast ballots. The question was
to vote \$40,000 bonds to retire notes
totaling that amount.

Increased valuations placed on the
properties of the Portland Railway,
Light & Power company by the state
tax commission for the year 1924 will
boost the taxes of the corporation ap-
proximately \$1000 a day.

K. K. Kubli, speaker of the Oregon
house of representatives, was badly
bruised and scratched when an auto
in which he was riding with D. E.
Fletcher, representative of Polk coun-
ty, hit a culvert near Stanfield.

With the bottom out of the hop
market it was reported at Salem that
many growers who rejected offers for
25 and 30 cents a pound for their hops
are now anxious to take anything
within reason for their holdings.

Motor vehicle blanks for 1924 have
been mailed out by Sam A. Koser,
secretary of state. The blanks go to
162,000 passenger car and commercial
vehicle owners, 3100 motorcycle own-
ers, 560 dealers and 13,900 chauffeurs.

The new Salem hospital is so near
completion that patients are being
transferred to the wards. The hos-
pital is modern in every particular and
was erected at a cost of \$150,000. It
will not be completed for several
weeks.

A total of 25,940 automobiles, or ap-
proximately one out of every six reg-
istered, has been transferred to a new
owner after the original license plate
was issued, during the last year, ac-
cording to figures compiled by Sec-
retary of State Koser.

H. H. Haines of Portland, who is in
the east in the interest of the logan-
berry industry, has written business
associates in Salem that he has
interested a number of eastern bak-
ing syndicates in the use of logan-
berries in pie production.

The Oregon public service commis-
sion has granted authority to the
Clark & Wilson Lumber company of
Linnton to construct a logging rail-
road across the Pittsburg-St. Helens
market road near Clatskanie creek
bridge in Columbia county.

With the selection of Eugene as the
meeting place for the 1924 conven-
tion and the nomination of officers to
be formally elected by referendum
vote of the membership, the 21st an-
nual convention of the Oregon State
Federation of Labor adjourned at As-
toria.

Miss Nora Ellis, confessed slayer
of Gordon Mett, waived examina-
tion at her preliminary hearing in
the justice of the peace court in Pen-
dleton. She was remanded to the cus-
tody of the sheriff to await the action
of the grand jury, which will meet in
December.

Three million humpback salmon
eggs have been distributed to Oregon
hatcheries, according to announce-
ment made by Dr. Thomas W. Ross,
member of the Oregon Fish commis-
sion. They are to be planted in the
Nehalem, Tillamook, Yaquina, Sius-
law and Coos rivers.

An attempt further to amend the
constitution by doing away with the
referendum and elect federation of-
ficers at the convention was blocked
after a heated discussion at the con-
vention of the Oregon State Federa-
tion of Labor at Astoria. The resolu-
tions adopted at the convention in-
clude the following: Favoring the
strict enforcement of the Volstead
act; urging unionists to refuse to buy
at any store unless they are waited
upon by a clerk wearing a union but-
ton and requesting them to confine
their trading to between the hours of
9 and 6 week days; to promote edu-
cation in the use of the union label;
indorsing the movement to restrict
immigration for a period of five years;
calling on the governor to appoint a
committee of nine members, including
three employers, three farmers and
three members of organized labor, to
investigate and report to him on the
workmen's compensation act; in-
structing the office of the federation
to assist in bringing about an amend-
ment to the state constitution which
will permit enactment and enforce-
ment of a law providing for compul-
sory acceptance by employers of the
state industrial accident insurance.
