DON'T "IMPROVE" ON NATURE

Introduction of English Sparrow in
United States an Example
of Its Unwisdom.

There have been some disastrous ex-
periments in the direction of "improving"
on nature. For instance, when
rats became such a nuisance in Ja-
maica the East Indian mongoose was
introduced to rid the island of the
pest. But today the mongoose is a
greater nuisance than the rat, and be-
ing bigger and hungrier and quicker
on its feet it is worse than the thing
it was introduced to destroy.

MUST CHANGE MAP OF ETNA

Recent Eruption of the Sicilian Vol-
cano Probably Has Made
Great Alterations.

Seventeen years ago when Vesuvius
was angry all maps had to be rectified
after the eruption. The extreme sum-
mit of the mountain had become con-
siderably lower and the crater was
much deeper. Now the Etna eruption
was much more violent than that of
Vesuvius, which means probably the
sides of the Sicilian volcano will also
have to be changed on the map.

In spite of its great activity the
eruption of Vesuvius can be observed
from one end to the other by an ex-
pert. Doctor Matteucci spent three
days and three nights in a recess of
the smoking crater. He was thought
to be dead. When he returned he
could not hide his joy, not at having
escaped death by a miracle, but at
being able to make observations on the
spot of this tremendous phenomenon,
of which he had been certainly a most
indiscreet witness.

His successor, Professor Malladra,
has been observing the different phases
of the recent Etna convulsions. But
he was not able to approach as near
as Doctor Matteucci on Vesuvius.—
L'Opinion.

LIKE GEMS SET IN THE SEA

Many Beautiful Little Islands Around
Great Britain Are Frequented
by Holiday Crowds.

say that the Isle of Man is the most
popular holiday island in the world.
Its glens and even its mountains are
turned into show places, whilst Dou-
glas is, perhaps, next to Blackpool, the
most enterprising seaside town in the
British Isles.

The Isle of Wight is what the

mons, when compared with Manxland.

squadron, and Cowes week is one of
the great events of the season, says
London Tit-Bits.

NITRATE DESERT AIDS WORLD

Desolate Region in Plateau Country
of Chile Is Source of Famous
Soda Commodity.

In the high plateau country of Chile,
between the coast ranges and the
Andes, lies a desert which is one of
the dearest spots on earth. No green
thing grows upon it, no living crea-
ture is native to it.

And yet this desert has been for a
century a primary support of human
life in the civilized world, says the
Nation's Business. Although science
now promises eventually to make us
independent of this desert and its
product, it is no exaggeration to say
that the great expansion of the race
which has taken place in the last hun-
dred years would have been impossible
without it. And the people of the
United States are still largely depend-
ent upon it.

This unique desert is the source of
the famous Chilean nitrate of soda—
a commodity which is at present the
subject of a special investigation be-
ing made at the behest of congress by
the bureau of foreign and domestic
commerce.

The nitrate situation and the inves-
tigation of it are significant not only
because of the importance of wider
use of such valuable fertilizing agents
as nitrate of soda, and of as cheap a
supply as possible, but also because
factors controlling the supply of ni-
trates are typical of those that affect
a number of other raw materials
which are indispensable to civilized
countries.
