For many years we have heard the saying "Keep your money in the Circle," which means when you spend a dollar in your own locality for home made goods, the same dollar will be spent again in the same locality and will help to keep up the home standard of circulation instead of going east or elsewhere to enrich far-away people. Few people realize that the home spent dollar means a great deal more than that. It helps to build up the home banking institution and increases your credit. It helps in providing a home market for your home products; for example, the more paper you buy from home mills in preference to the products of distant concerns, the greater the consumption of the products of your forests; the more Tillamook cheese you use instead of New York's output, the greater the demand for the domestic cow. Not alone does it stimulate the market for all domestic products but it has a tendency as well to promote production of a better class of goods. A thoroughly good home market demands quality goods and the producing company must stand or fall by the quality of its product.

During the last half century organized labor has shown the world what can be accomplished by unionization. California farmers' co-operation has proven the efficiency of pulling together. The organization of all classes in Oregon into a combination, as it were, with the definite purpose of patronizing home industries wherever possible would be in effect the equivalent of a union, and its results would be of like character.

As a pure matter of advertising, perhaps no other one thing would do more to effect a sale of Oregon as a country desirable to live in. We have the climate, we have the soil for production, we have the timber and mineral resources. It needs but to offer a country where all the citizens pull together for the welfare of the entire state, a state where practically all citizens use home grown products and home manufactured goods, to attract prospective settlers as the lode attracts the magnet.

Let us then build up the home country, put on a continuing campaign for the sale of home products and show potential settlers a State where they actually live up to the slogan "Oregon Goods for Oregon People."

Address by Harry Wade, President of the Insurance Department, Knights of Pythias

Brother Knights:

The week of April 6th to 12th, 1924, has been declared Insurance Department week throughout our Supreme Domain. Hermes lodge is joining in the celebration, and I desire to talk to you regarding this department of our organization and will make some statements that I believe you will all be interested in.

Our Order is the plant of human hope in full bloom. It has comforted those in distress, helped those crushed by sorrow, replenished the cupboards, brought warmth to our hearts and homes. Our Order is a fraternity where friendship is the ruling factor, patriotism and loyalty to country our sublime aim, and the care of home and family our supreme purpose. In sixty years of fraternal endeavor our benefactions to humanity are beyond number and our future outlook for future service to mankind is as boundless as the infinity of space.

I congratulate you upon membership in this greatest of all American fraternal societies, and as a brother Knight, ask you to direct your attention for a few moments to the great branch of our Order which functions along a well defined and practical service giving plan.

Our Insurance Department is the Home Saving Station of Pythian fraternity. Home is the dearest place on earth—the one lasting and unchangeable ideal of human life. Our care of home reflects the progress of mankind and home sentiment overrules the forces of selfishness and stirs men's souls with the sweetest emotions and the kindest feelings known to the race. Your Order has fixed a standard of loyalty by declaring that the care of home and those bound to us by the ties of love is the true measure of Pythian fidelity. If, then, home is life's greatest factor, its protection is man's greatest duty. It is the measure of man's character and the goal of his greatest ambition. To enable every member of the Order to make assured provision for his home in event of his untimely death, your Insurance Department was founded and nurtured through the last forty-seven years and now occupies a position in the realm of practical service to our Pythian membership second to no organization of its kind on the American continent.

NEW MODERN BUILDINGS FOR ALBANY COLLEGE

Albany student self-help college, located at Albany, Ore., is to have at least three modern new buildings in which to house its many departments of education, when the campaign now on throughout the state is finished and \$600,000 is raised for expansion purposes. Rapid progress is being made in organization work, according to J. Henry Lang, director, at headquarters in the Multnomah hotel, Portland.

At Albany college, every student entered must earn all or part of their way by some of the various methods of work employed, it being the policy of the school thus to inculcate habits of the students carrying their own load, the college lending them a helping hand while doing it. It is believed by the faculty and trustees that this better fits a student for life work, hence it is made obligatory.

Friends of Christian education are being enlisted in the campaign and the response to the call for service has been splendid. Because of the excellent record of the college and the splendid field of opportunity in the northwest, it is believed that a like response will be forthcoming when funds are asked for to put the school on a thoroughly standardized basis as to buildings and productive endowment. Albany college already has \$212,000 productive endowment, but to enlarge its scope and to provide more self-help facilities, it is necessary to have the additional \$600,000, \$100,000 of which has already been subscribed in Albany and vicinity.
