State Board Wants More Power.

Oregon has a very liberal Workingmen's compensation law that provides generously for all persons who may be injured by accidents that occur to employees in all industries.

But by the terms of compensation being fixed by the state for any injury, from bruising a finger to loss of life or limb, the employer, by waving his common law defenses, may still contract insurance outside of the state.

The workingmen's Compensation Commission provides hospital treatment, has legal advice and hires physicians and pays doctor and drug bills and now wants to cut off the little competition the employer has left.

Nearly all states but Oregon allow employers to give bonds for complying with the terms of settlement and care of the injured worker as fixed by the state or allow insurance to be carried with casualty companies.

Oregon employers, if the present commission can have its way, will be forced to accept service from the State Commission, making it a compulsory monopoly whether the service is efficient or not, penalizing Oregon employes.

Why should not an Oregon employer have every advantage enjoyed by the employers of other states? Why make it hard to operate in Oregon?—Ind. News.

Prefer Delaware to Oregon

The Bunker Hill-Sullivan Mining and Smelting Corporation has withdrawn from Oregon and will hereafter operate under the corporation laws of Delaware.

It is a mining company that has for many years paid its corporation taxes in Oregon, but has grown tired of freak legislation of web-foot brand.

Like Instant Postum advertising, there's a reason. The property was bought by Portland capital in 1886, and Oregon has been its corporate home.

Millions of dollars in dividends and millions of investment have come to Portland, even buying the Portland Hotel, and some may still come.

The capital stock of the Bunker Hill-Sullivan is only \$3,270,000, and while no official reason is given for leaving Oregon, state income tax is named.

The Wallace, Idaho, Times says the transfer of the company from Oregon to Delaware was directly due to the Oregon State Income Tax law.

Farm Pointers

Cultivation of raw crops in Oregon should begin while the weeds are small, says the experiment station. The first cultivations are usually made with a harrow or weeder and later cultivations with a toothed cultivator. The cultivator should be run about three inches deep or just deep enough to stir the soil sufficiently to kill the weeds and cover up weeds in the row. In some instances on rather hard soils deep early cultivation should be made.

Land for kale should be well manured and after plowing must be kept clean of weeds until planting time, which is usually after a favorable rain in June. Kale plants should be set deep to make them

grow close to the ground and avoid excessively tall stalks in the field, the experiment station finds. The tall stalks are more susceptible to winter injury.

For late planting for hog or poultry feed the experiment station finds Japanese or silver hull buckwheat offers most promise. It is sowed like grain on a well prepared seed bed any time from the middle of May to the end of June. Forty-five pounds of seed are used per acre. It usually keeps growing as long as the moisture lasts, or until frost stops it. It is especially valuable for poultry seed and for sale to millers.

Diseased potato plants should be removed from the seed fields as soon as they appear, the Oregon station advises. Sick plants are a source of infection from which disease may spread to other plants in the field. Potato seed buyers are becoming more particular in their choice of seed and demand seed of better quality.
