Watches Are Affected by Actions of Owner

"I can't understand why this watch doesn't keep proper time. I paid a good price for it, too."

Time and again one hears words to this effect from unfortunate people who simply cannot get a watch to record correctly the unceasing march of old Father Time. In many cases, however, it is not the fault of the watch at all, but of the wearer's temperament, for modern timepieces are so delicately adjusted that they are affected by this.

A case is recorded of a woman who was constantly taking her watch to the maker with complaints that it was either too fast or too slow. So tired did he become of her constant visits that he wore the watch for a week himself, and found that it kept perfect time. He then made inquiries, and found that the woman was a sufferer from a nervous complaint; at times she was alert and vivacious, and at others she was the victim of fits of depression. When she was in the latter mood the watch went slow, but when she was bright and lively it gained.

Many men who limp, or have some other peculiarity in their walk, have been unable to wear a watch which keeps correct time. Even changing the pocket in which it is generally carried has been known to have a disastrous effect on the best of timepieces.

Engine drivers have on occasion found that their watches kept perfect time as long as they were working on one route, but directly they went on to relief duty and had to drive over lines with which they were not acquainted their watches became hopelessly out of order.

When you take your watch to be regulated you should, if possible, tell the watch repairer the circumstances in which the instrument went wrong.—Detroit Free Press.

U. S. Measures Snow to Aid Irrigation Projects

Extensive "snow surveys" are sometimes made by the weather bureau of the United States Department of Agriculture in regions where the water required for irrigation is obtained almost entirely from melting snow. The mountain slopes constitute natural reservoirs, from which the moisture that falls in winter as snow is gradually led through spring and summer to the surrounding country. In order to ascertain the total amount of water available, the snow surveyor travels over the watershed, often on skis or snowshoes, cutting sections of snow with a cylindrical "snow sampler" and weighing them with a small spring balance. The weather bureau also maintains in the Western mountains a number of special stations at which daily measurements of snowfall are made for the benefit of irrigation projects.

The heaviest snowfall in the United States occurs in the high Sierra Nevada of California and in the Cascade range of Washington and Oregon. At places in both of these regions more than sixty-five feet of snow has fallen in a single winter. The snow sometimes lies twenty-five feet deep on the ground, burying one-story houses to the eaves.

Stars We Cannot See

Two hundred millions of millions of miles away is a star called Algol. It is the second brightest star in the constellation of Perseus, and it has the curious habit of varying in brightness at regular intervals.

After much research we know now that Algol consists of two stars—one bright, the other dark. They are each about a million miles in diameter and about two million miles apart. They revolve around one another, and when the dark star is between us and the bright one, the light we receive from the latter diminishes.

There are several other stars of the Algol type, and it is simply through our researches that we are aware that there exist in the heaven dark stars—stars which give no light at all and are in themselves totally invisible.

How many there may be we do not know, for it is only by their power of eclipsing bright stars that we can recognize them at all.

Gorgeous Visiting Cards

Mrs. Burton Kingsland, author of "Etiquette for All Occasions," says that "in the early days, when everybody's visiting cards strove to be individual, the resulting products must have looked not unlike the old-fashioned valentines dear to our childhood. We read of creations made out of paper or cardboard finished with a sheen to imitate silk, enamel or what not—perhaps bordered with lace paper that framed a hand-painted landscape. The owner's name—though the raison d'être of the card—was really the least of it, but might be discovered in a graceful scroll evolving from the beak of a little bird singing in a tree top."

According to Mrs. Kingsland, even so late as the 1840s, young men of fashion affected a card highly glazed with the name in such microscopic characters as to be almost illegible, which had succeeded the custom of engraving a facsimile of the owner's signature.—Detroit News.

Throat Disorder Cause of Most Heart Disease

Any inflammation of the joints in children or young persons, especially if accompanied by fever, should be looked upon as a possible source of damage to the heart, and calls for rest in bed and treatment by the family physician. In children rheumatism shows itself not only in the form of rheumatic fever, but in other ways that are less easily recognized—especially as troublesome "growing pains" and as the nervous affection known as chorea, or St. Vitus' dance.

The conditions have the same dangerous possibilities of setting up inflammation of the heart valves as has inflammatory rheumatism itself and deserves the same careful treatment.

"In children who have had rheumatic symptoms of any sort, or who have signs of damage to the heart valves, infected tonsils and adenoids should be removed and scrupulous care should be given to the teeth and mouth," Dr. Lewis A. Conner, professor of medicine at the Cornell university medical school, said in a recent radio lecture broadcast by the New York state department of health. "A better understanding on the part of parents, teachers and the general public of the important relation of throat infections and the various rheumatic manifestations of childhood to valvular heart disease would prevent many children from becoming subject to heart disease."—New York Times.

Mice Answer Dinner Bell

White mice have been taught the meaning of the dinner bell. What is more, they have been able to transmit some sense of its significance to their offspring so that they may more easily be taught to jump for the table when the bell rings. The experiments are described in Science by Prof. Ivan P. Pawlow, the Russian physiologist.

The first generation of white mice required 300 lessons before they realized that the ringing of an electric bell meant that dinner was ready. After that they quickly trotted to the feeding place when they heard it tinkle.

Their young ones caught on to the trick after only 100 lessons, while their offspring in turn learned after only 80. The fifth generation had apparently so well inherited the tendency to "obey that impulse" that after only five trials they were ready and waiting.

Professor Pawlow hopes that future generations will know the meaning of an electric bell, just as surely as a new-born chick knows the meaning of a fragment of grain.

Commonest Metal

Iron is the metal most used by man, yet the metal which is by far commonest in the earth's crust is not iron, but calcium. Forty per cent of limestone is calcium. Calcium is a very light metal, easily hammered, easily drawn out into wire, and almost as pretty in color as gold. Why then, you may ask, do we not make more use of it? There are two reasons: the first that it is very difficult to isolate from its ores, but the second is worse. When isolated, let the merest drop of moisture touch calcium and it flizzes away into slaked lime. The present price of calcium is about twenty times that of gold.

Balk Forestation

Great trees from little seeds may grow—sometimes. Experts of the United States forest service have found that many of the western yellow pine forests in the Northwest second-growth pine is not multiplying as it should.

The older trees are there. These trees bear plenty of cones. These cones carry enough seed to start the new growth. But the seed never gets a chance to dig in. Squirrels collect and store the potential forest for their own use.—Science Service.
