OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

Katherine Everett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Everett of Portland, will rule over the May-day festivities on the Willamette University campus May 2 and 3.

Bertram Thorsell, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. P. Thorsell of St. Helens, was killed when he fell from the running board of a friend's automobile as it turned a corner.

The Southern Pacific Railroad company has abandoned its daylight train between Eugene and Marshfield, and as a substitute is running a gasoline car on the old schedule.

Thurman Berry, chief of police at Junction City and for many years a resident there, dropped dead from heart disease just as he had finished locking up a prisoner he had arrested.

Wasco county wheat growers are now represented in a co-operative association, set up under the federal farm board, following an organization meeting in the Columbia district recently.

The Robert hotel of Reedsport, a frame structure, burned recently, with a loss estimated at \$15,000. All occupants escaped without injury, and most of them saved their belongings.

Election of directors of the Apple Growers' association at the annual meeting a few days ago, resulted in re-election of nine members of the former board of 11 and two new members.

Mayor Livesley has vetoed two ordinances passed by the city council of Salem providing for a bond issue of \$7000 to finance the appraisal of the local water system with a view to municipal ownership.

Floyd F. Hoyt shot a black wolf on his farm three miles southeast of Springfield. Farmers of that locality thought dogs had been worrying their livestock. The wolf was evidently an old one and had traveled far.

Taking for its motto, "Let us not live for ourselves alone," the Lakeview Chamber of Commerce has adopted a plan to meet with chambers of neighboring towns for the purpose of working out mutual problems more effectively.

A bill authorizing an appropriation of \$60,000 for the erection of a gymnasium at the Chemawa Indian school, five miles north of Salem, has been approved by the appropriations committee of the U. S. senate, according to a telegram received from Senator McNary.

In the Morrow county spelling contest in Heppner recently, Strawberry school won first place with Doris Klinger, winner. Heppner won second with Cleo Duncan, winner, assisted by Jennie Swendig, and one third with Clifford Yarnell and Marion Hale, spellers.

Construction of a \$50,000 theatre in Lakeview has been announced by a group of Lakeview business men. The new showhouse will fill a long felt need in that city, it is reported, and is to be equipped with the new large size projection screen and sound equipment.

The sum of \$1000 was voted for the purpose of oiling the principal streets of Glendale by the city council. This action was taken after a merchants' committee complained about the annual summer dust nuisance and volunteered to donate at least \$150 to help pay for the oiling.

The new grange hall in Central Point, a one-story and basement building, 44 feet by 85 feet, costing more than \$7000, is nearing completion. The Pomona grange will hold the first meeting in the new structure the last of this month, at which time Governor Norblad is scheduled to speak.

Miss Hazel Bartley of McMinnville has been chosen by the Linfield student body to reign over the festival on May 2 as May queen.

Building permits issued in McMinnville during the first three months of the year totaled \$15,980, figures at the office of the city recorder reveal. This is considerably lower than the same period last year when more than \$100,000 in building permits were issued during a similar period.

Gus Schirmer of Keating was seriously injured at a mine about five miles from Keating when a charge of dynamite exploded. Schirmer set the charge, and as it did not go off he went back in about an hour and a half to investigate it. The dynamite exploded and injured both eyes.

The government land office at Roseburg sold 14 tracts of grant land timber in ten counties for a total of \$115,074.27. The largest purchase was by the Fruit Growers' Supply company of San Francisco, which took 640 acres in Josephine county, near the California line, for lumber for box shooks.

State prohibition operatives participated in 125 arrests for liquor law violations during the month of March, according to a report filed with Governor Norblad by George Alexander, state prohibition director. Fines were imposed in the amount of \$15,865, with jail sentences aggregating 755 days.

Two more dens of rattlesnakes, containing a total of 71, together with one scorpion and a number of non-poisonous snakes, were found near Canyonville, making the third to be located in a week. McKinley Huntington discovered the dens. The nests were blown out with dynamite and the rattlers killed.

A recent school election both at Florence and at Cushman and held to consolidate the two high school districts resulted favorably, 68 Florence voters doing so unanimously and the Cushman district polling a still heavier vote, and with a majority for consolidation. Plans for a new high school building will now be made.

The famous Oregon caves—generally conceded to be one of the major attractions of the state—are to be completely renovated and lighted within the next few months, according to an announcement by Major John D. Guthrie, assistant district forester. The caves are in Josephine county, 52 miles southwest of Grants Pass.

Planting of 300 experimental acres of garden lands in the Salem district from the state fair grounds north to Gervais was announced at Salem by the Associated Seed company of Hartford, Conn. Only vegetable and garden seeds will be produced. The experiment presages development of more than 10,000 acres of garden land in that vicinity.

Approximately \$400,000 will be available for the protection of forest lands in Oregon during 1930, according to a report prepared by F. A. Elliott, state forester. This money will finance a personnel of more than 400 men and provide for improvements and equipment. There are approximately 10,500,000 acres of Oregon land under the jurisdiction of the state forester.

A total of 752 persons were killed and 24,355 were injured in traffic accidents on Oregon highways during the six year period from 1924 to 1929 inclusive, according to figures compiled by T. A. Rafferty, chief of the state traffic squad. Recorded accidents during this period totaled 170,076. Oregon was one of six states in the Union showing a reduction in the number of fatal accidents during the year, Rafferty declared.

Ben Clelen of Albany recently put an end to the fishing career of a three foot gartersnake that he saw running for cover with a ten-inch eastern brook trout in its mouth. Clelen, with at least six other Albany people looking on, killed the snake at the Roaring river fish hatchery near Albany. The snake had seized the trout in a pool. The fish was restored to the pool and in a few minutes was swimming about, apparently uninjured.

According to the Jackson County Central Civic council plans are under way to preserve for southern Oregon the historic relics of the Jacksonville museums. Funds for better housing the collection and for hire of a caretaker are required. The museum includes the old Beekman banking building and contents intact, the first bank established in Oregon, as well as a big collection exhibited in the famous old-time U. S. hotel building and another collection housed in the first brick building erected in Jacksonville in 1854, still intact.

The several irrigation districts in Rogue river valley are turning the flood and natural flow of the streams into the canal system to conserve all available water. This is a purely precautionary measure against a predicted dry season.

John Bilbeau, 40, a trapper and miner in the Coffee creek district, a remote section of the south Umpqua territory above Tillier, committed suicide and attempted to cremate his body in an abandoned cabin. He had been suffering from a leg infection

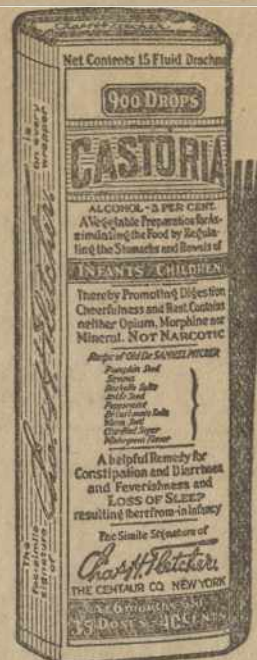
