Students Organize for Music Work at U. of O.

University of Oregon, Eugene. — Creation of a campus-wide committee to stimulate and direct interest in music, and the appointment of Lois Nelson, sophomore, of La Grande, as chairman, was announced recently by Tom Stoddard, president of the Associated Students of the University of Oregon.

Each living organization on the campus will be represented on the committee, which will have for ex-officio members all persons on the faculty of the school of music. It will be the duty of each student to aid in promotion of recitals, concerts and other musical events that are being staged on the campus throughout the year.

The committee has the full approval of Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the university, who is especially interested in music and a development of appreciation for it on the campus.

Miss Nelson has been active in numerous campus projects during her career, and this year has been serving as music reporter and critic for the student daily, and for other publications.

To Teach at U. of O.



Reginald Coggeshall, sports editor of the Paris edition of the New York Herald, will come to the University of Oregon as professor of journalism next fall, it is announced by Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism. Fresh from nearly five years of active and varied newspaper work, Mr. Coggeshall has been recommended to take the place left vacant by the resignation of Dr. Ralph D. Casey, who has accepted the position of head of the department of journalism at the University of Minnesota.

In addition to his newspaper experience, Mr. Coggeshall has also done some teaching at Harvard and at Tufts university, and is warmly recommended by both educators and practical newspapermen. He graduated from Harvard in 1916, and took advanced work there and at Tufts.

While in Europe, Mr. Coggeshall has travelled extensively, both in connection with his work and while on vacations. He has visited England, Germany, Austria, Hungary, Switzerland, Italy and other countries and has made special studies of their conditions.
