OREGON STATE NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Principal Events of the Week Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

Gov. and Mrs. W. H. Myers celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary in Eugene recently.

A charter for the Bank of Astoria was issued by A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks, recently.

Five ears of corn which weigh 6½ pounds have been brought into Cottage Grove by Fred Wright from his ranch at Walker.

The Marlon county court has been petitioned to increase the price for testing cows for tuberculosis from 25 cents to 40 cents per cow as in Polk county.

More than \$1000 a day, or approximately \$9000 a week, is distributed in cream and milk checks to farmers of three counties by the Mount Angel creamery.

The Coos County Bent Seed company has two men at Florence with a threshing machine to hull bent grass seed purchased by the company in that section.

Operation of the \$75,000 Grays River plant of the Lower Columbia Co-operative Dairy association began recently. The new plant has a capacity of 50,000 pounds of milk per day.

The first turkeys are being prepared for market by Crooked River ranchers. E. J. Stringer has on his ranch in the Lone Pine section 1500 turkeys that will average about 21 pounds each.

Sheepmen of Morrow and Umatilla counties have decided upon a maximum wage to \$50 per month for herders. Shearing contracts for next season will be based on 10 cents per head.

A total of 25 persons were killed and 398 persons were injured in 2435 traffic accidents in Oregon during September, according to a report prepared by the state traffic department.

Mary F. Riddle, the first white child born in Cow Creek valley, Douglas county, died at her home at Riddle. She was born April 5, 1852. Her parents were the second settlers in Cow Creek valley.

An 18-pound silverside jumped into a rowboat occupied by Mr. and Mrs. William Davidson and Mrs. F. S. Perry near Bandon. It almost capsized them before they subdued the salmon and reached shore.

David Legler, 63, a farmer of Tigard, died in a Portland hospital from internal injuries. Legler was handling a shotgun when it was accidentally discharged. The butt of the gun struck him in the stomach.

A barreling plant in Scio capable of handling the output of 300 acres of strawberries is contemplated by the B. F. Emery company of Portland, it was announced at the strawberry rally held there recently.

The Bank of Stayton has a forceful example of Ben Franklin's old axiom "save for old age and a cold winter" in one of their windows. It is a live grey digger and 837 walnuts the little fellow had swiped in 14 days.

The Dalles Co-operative Growers' plant has completed running about 500 tons of apples on the cost-plus contract with the Fruit Factors, Inc. The plant is being operated as fast as fruit can be shipped in and out.

The interstate commerce commission has submitted a report recommending that the Sumpter Valley railroad be permitted to abandon a portion of its line in Grant county, Oregon, between Bates and Prairie City.

The last Umpqua valley cantaloupes for the season have been shipped from Roseburg, making approximately 53,000 crates shipped out this year. While not very profitable to growers, it has been established that the melon industry of Douglas county can be made a great factor.

GOOD THINGS TO EAT

The bride of today with all her equipment in culinary knowledge has no fear of failures in cookery. Up-to-date cook books with clear directions for preparing even the simple foods gives assurance to the most inexperienced.

Here is one which any bride will like to try:

Fancy Biscuit.—Take two cupfuls of flour, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one tablespoonful of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of shortening, one egg and two-thirds of a cupful of milk, one-third cupful of sliced dates, four tablespoonfuls of peanut butter and one egg yolk. Sift the dry ingredients, work in the shortening with a fork until well blended, add milk and well beaten egg to form a soft dough. Roll out on a floured board and cut small rounds. Spread one with peanut butter, place one or two slices of dates and cover with another round. Press the edges together to enclose the butter and dates. Brush with egg diluted with a little milk or water and bake in a hot oven. If preferred cut the rounds larger and put the butter and date on one-half and fold over, pinching the edges together.

Mocha Frosting.—Take one-fourth cupful of butter, one tablespoonful of cocoa, two cupfuls of confectioner's sugar and three to four tablespoonfuls of strong coffee infusion. Cream the butter, add the cocoa. Stir in the sugar and coffee gradually. Beat until smooth and spread on the cake.

Coffee Ice Cream.—Scald one and one-half cupfuls of milk with one-third of a cupful of finely ground coffee, strain through a double cheese cloth, add one cupful of sugar, the beaten yolks of four eggs, one-fourth teaspoonful of salt; cook over water until thick, adding one-fourth cupful of sugar and one cupful of cream; cool, add three more cupfuls of cream and freeze. Serve garnished with maraschino cherries.

First Washing Machine Got Inventor "In Bad"

Therill E. Raisin of Glory, Maryland, who is credited by Country Home with being the first man to experiment with a washing machine, occupies no place in the ranks of men who emancipated women and lightened their burdens. Entirely to the contrary, such was the womanly scorn that Therill aroused in his sister Emily by his interference with the sacred Monday morning wash-tub rites, that at the age of sixty he had to leave his home forever under the suspicion of being not quite mentally sound.

The would-be inventor, says the article, had such an aversion to work that he hated to see others toiling, and wash day brought him particularly keen pangs. Mr. Raisin took a discarded butter churn, filled it with water, soap and several pairs of overalls and induced a colored man named Benjamin to operate it.

The idea was superb, the execution all wrong. The overalls and churn were wreckage in no time at all and there was such a furore about it that Therill moved out. "Go ahead and rub your hands off on your dorned washboard," he said, in parting. "I ain't saying you can't get clothes clean on a washboard, but one of these days you're going to have washing machines and then you'll think of me."
