## AUGUST ROSSI PASSES AWAY MARCH 24

**Was Born in Fornace de  
Barga, Tuscany, Italy  
in 1871**

**CAME HERE IN 1884**

**Funeral Was One of the Largest  
Held in the City—Buried at  
Patton Cemetery.**

August Rossi, aged 56, passed away March 24 at his home in Beaverton. His health had been failing for two years and about a week before his death had an attack of acute indigestion that weakened his heart. He had been called to Portland on jury duty and was returning home when he suddenly became ill. He drove his car off the road into the ditch. His son Albert came by in a truck and seeing him sitting there, brought him home. He became better but was ill again and passed away at 10 p. m.

Mr. Rossi was born in Fornace de Barga, Tuscany, Italy, and came to this country with his parents in 1884. He dedicated free right of way thru his farm to the Oregon Electric because he thought it would help build a town. He was very generous in all subscriptions to charity at all times and did everything in his power to help the community. He served as councilman for seven years continuously. Only recently he commenced construction of a modern concrete building. His dream was to see the widening of the Canyon road and the bridge built over the Wilson river, as it would help Beaverton. His widow, Hattie, and children Elva, Frank, Raymond and Albert survive. Funeral arrangements were under the supervision of W. E. Pegg. Services were held at the house at 9 a. m. by the B. P. O. E. and at 10 services were held in the Catholic church, Father O'Neil officiating. The pallbearers were James Lewis, Joseph Leibrick, James Hennehan, Francis Leis, J. W. Raymond. Interment was in Patton cemetery at Raleigh station.

Mr. Rossi was a man of strong character and his word was as good as his signature. He was always working for the good of Beaverton and his death will be felt by the entire community.

## BLANKS BRING STORM OF PROTEST

**Must Be Returned to Assessor  
Within 20 days After  
Delivery to Tax Payer**

## FAVORS BIG BUSINESS

**Inventories Were Taken January 1st,  
So Firms Must Check up to  
March 1st.**

The blanks providing for assessment of taxable property under the new laws passed by the legislature this year, were distributed last week and have raised a storm of protest from merchants. The blank provides for an adjustment of inventory to March 1 when most merchants take an annual inventory January 1. This will involve a tedious checking and a certain amount of guessing. Two sets of records will have to be kept one for assessment blanks, March 1 to Feb 28 and the federal and state income tax from Jan. 1 to December 31, involving expense, to which the small merchant may mean that he will not have to pay any federal income tax.

Criticism made this week was aimed at the short time allowed for return of report, 20 days, and the confidential disclosure of business records that would be accessible for competitors at any time.

It is understood that a suit to test the constitutionality of the measure is threatened.

## All Teachers Re-elected in Both Schools For 1927-28
