VIRGINIA SIBLEY PASSED AWAY

Daughter of Rev. and Mrs. F. R. Sibley Never Relieved After Accident.

Hearing a crash in front of her home, Mrs. F. R. Sibley, of Tigard, rushed out to help the victim of an automobile accident and found it was her own daughter, Virginia. Carefully and tenderly A. E. Johnson and Ed Henshaw picked up the unconscious girl and carried her into her home and phoned for the doctor.

Rev. Sibley was not home but was out making calls and could not be located for an hour.

Dr. Barrett, of Tigard, and Dr. Joyce, of Portland, were called but both declared there was no hope for her recovery as death would be only a matter of hours.

She lingered until 12:30 p. m. Saturday when she passed away at her home among her relatives, and she never regained consciousness.

Virginia had alighted from the school bus which had stopped in front of her home and walked behind it to cross the highway. A car driven by Harry Daniels, attorney in the Porter building, Portland, approached the stage and attempted to pass the girl by driving in the ditch, but the car tipped over on her.

No blame is attached to Mr. Daniels as he had slowed down for the railroad crossing and did everything in his power to avert the accident.

Those in the school bus were: James Whitworth, driver; Ira Barrett, Merton Robertson, George Holmes, Helen Stiles, Tigard, Milton Carrup and Mamie Smith of Metzger. Miss Virginia Sibley was born in Yongehow, China, and had celebrated her 17th birthday March 17, and was a junior in the Beaverton high school. Her parents, Rev. and Mrs. F. R. Sibley, and one sister, Mrs. Warren Day, of Portland, survive her.

Funeral services were held at the M. E. church at Tigard Sunday at 2:30 p. m. and interment was at Crescent Grove cemetery. W. E. Pegg was in charge of arrangements.

The family have the sympathy of the entire community in the tragic death of their daughter and sister.

The services were in charge of Dr. A. L. Howard, superintendent of the Portland district, assisted by Dr. T. E. Elliott, and Dr. Frank Lawyer, of Portland, and Dr. Tufts, of Metzger. Miss Carlotta Gilbert was at the piano. The soloist was George Hosking.

Deputy Sheriff McMahon directed traffic on the Highway during the funeral in a very able manner. The church was crowded and cars lined both sides of the Highway for blocks.

Nash Duck Installs Brooder

Has Concrete Pens, Runways and Gutters—Will Care for 3000 Ducks

The Tigard Plumbing company has just completed for Mr. Nash, of the Nash duck farm, one of the most modern hot water heating brooder systems in the northwest.

The brooder house is 32x100 feet with concrete pens, runways and gutters, so that the entire room and pens can be flushed off and cleaned in a very short time.

The brooder rooms will now care for 2000 to 3000 baby ducks. Mr. Nash expects to raise 5000 ducks this

year. He finds a ready market for his dressed ducks in Portland.

Mr. Nash has a breeding stock of 140 ducks. He is preparing and installing necessary equipment to wash and dry the feathers which he will retail to the public. He also does custom hatching.

Mr. Nash sold several thousand ducks last year and has gradually built up his present business by hard work and good management. He has recently purchased the adjoining farm to accommodate his increasing business.

The Tigard Plumbing company of which N. Rickert is proprietor, is one of Tigard's newer business enterprises. Mr. Rickert purchased the property this last winter.
