In fact it is a cheap purchase with a large dividend, and in turn it brings much profit to work with one's neighbor for mutual benefit.

Several Firms Will Have
Temporary Location Till
Viaduct Is Finished

MAY RETURN LATER

Buildings Will Be Raised Nine Feet
—Wall will be Put In
And Fill Made.

The Capitol Fuel company will move their offices into the Parker building while the viaduct is being built and with the Multnomah Transfer company will return to their former place of business when the retaining wall and fill are put in. The county plans on raising the Ridenour and Conger building nine feet, putting in a retaining wall and filling this up to a level and then a sidewalk can be laid from the highway to these business houses. The stages have not yet announced their plans.

The Copeland Lumber company will soon have their new quarters ready on Illahee Way and Baird Lane.

Moline's garage and I. E. Putnam have not completed arrangements for their new location but Mr. Putnam may build on his lot next to the Multnomah Shoe Shop when the fill is made.

Ghormley's Filling Station will be moved up the road a ways but exact location can not now be announced.
