GROUNDS LAID LATER

May Use Oil as Fuel Next Winter Instead of Coal or Wood.

P. J. Van Bruggen, contractor, expects to finish the Union high school this week and it will be turned over to the directors for final inspection.

Last Saturday men were installing glass in the windows and the surplus lumber was either hauled away or burned.

The directors are now figuring on the probable cost of using oil instead of coal and wood for next year and if the cost is low enough will order it installed.

As soon as the weather moderates plans will be made for the laying of the corner stone. It is planned to have a big celebration and everyone in the four districts will be invited to attend. The date will be announced later.

A summary of the trip revealed the fact that we never were over 75 miles from a good camp or stores, never far from gas or oil, practically the whole distance over very fair roads, through hundreds of miles of fine scenery with fine weather so it was great from Tigard to Calgary without even a puncture and when a vote is taken we would all like to take the same trip again.
