BUYS BUILDING BACK AGAIN

J. H. Yeager Has Great Faith in the Growth of Beaverton

INSTALLS NEW OVEN

Weights Four Tons and Has Capacity of 240 Loaves of Bread at a Time.

Six months ago J. H. Yeager sold his property where his bakery now stands to Clara McKay believing it would be cheaper to rent than to pay taxes and up keep on such valuable land, but the rapid growth in business and influx of new residents has caused him to see that he made a mistake and Monday the property was transferred back in his name.

Mr. Yeager installed a new four-ton electric oven this week that cost him \$1500. It has eight switches for control of heat—four for the front of the oven and four for the back. The ovens are lined with tile and cement and are moisture proof. The walls are eight inches thick and made of a composition of asbestos that holds the heat, the oven only loses 200 degrees in 24 hours. The oven stands ten feet high and is 16 feet wide and 25 feet long, one side of the back of the building had to be removed before the oven could be installed. He will commence baking in this new oven the first of the week.
