WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE RECEIPE

CREAMED CODFISH.

Mrs. J. Lenz, Tigard.
One cup of milk, 4 crackers, 1 tablespoon butter, salt and pepper. Use can of codfish, shredded. Bake ½ hour. Delicious, serves five persons.

CHEESE STRAWS.

Mrs. E. Scovell, Multnomah.
One cup grated cheese, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, ½ teaspoon salt, 1-16 teaspoon cayenne pepper, ¼ teaspoon paprika, 1 egg, 2 tablespoons milk.

Mix together cheese, flour, baking powder, salt, cayenne pepper; add beaten egg, mix well; add milk enough to make a stiff dough. Roll out ¼ in. thick on floured board, cut into strips 5 inches long and ¼ inch wide, bake 10 minutes.

NUT BREAD

By Mrs. M. King, of Aloha.
1 egg, 1 cup milk, 3 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup nuts, chopped, 1 cup milk, ¼ cup sugar, 2 cups flour, ½ teaspoon salt. Mix, let stand 20 minutes, bake.

FRUIT SALAD

By Mrs. W. E. Pegg, Beaverton.
Can sliced pineapple, drain. Add to liquid, juice of ½ lemon, and 1 orange, ½ cup sugar, 2 teaspoons corn starch, boil until thick, set aside to cool. Cut pineapple in small pieces, also oranges and bananas, in summer time add strawberries. Put lettuce leaf on plate, arrange fruit, pour dressing over this just before serving. Put 1 tablespoon of whipped cream on top if desired.
