STICK TO YOUR OWN LINE

Many men fail because they get into things of which they know little. But their greatest failure is because they can not be told so. It is a good rule that measures its own length. If one buys ever so fine a set of tools and knows nothing about carpentry, the tools will rust by his own neglect. If one goes into the dry goods business and has no capacity for merchandising and no adaptability for dealing with the retail buying public, he is traveling a long, hard and financially precarious journey. Many men fail by trying to "take over" a newspaper, having no idea of what it means to get out a newspaper.

While it is needless to continue pointing out examples of failure, and while we do not propose any "rules for success," all will agree that men who are eminently successful in a lasting way are those trained for their jobs; men who stay on their jobs and stick to them. The "soldier of fortune" has a good time for a while. He lives a hundred years in ten while it lasts; he sees a lot of the world, but you notice he generally winds up broke and in the shadow of the poorhouse. In other words, he wins but in the end he loses. He and his kind are "color" for novelists, but they are seldom the backbone of progress.

MISSISSIPPI VALLEY RECONSTRUCTION

Sufferers from floods in the lower Mississippi Valley will find their hardships partly atoned in the reconstruction that will come. This has always been the case in similar misfortunes. Instead of the voice of one city or one community, it will be the reassurance of a great, fertile territory destined to continue its agricultural prosperity. The government of the United States has no greater burden in the coming years than to combine its financial resources and engineering skill to prevent floods, which carry in their wake famine and destruction.

The "bright side of disaster" is rehabilitation on a sounder basis than before. The first mark of progress is protection from the elements, and safety measures thru mechanical and artificial means. After that can come the uninterrupted flow of commerce, education, the arts, social progress and a higher civilization. Until then the people in flood districts are at the mercy of uncontrolled waters.

National life depends for its existence on individual and national character. Community life depends for its growth on cooperative citizenship. There could be no nation without communities out of which to make it. There could be no communities without people coming together to work out their business, social, educational and moral problems; and to what degree of perfection these problems are solved depends the kind of community we have.

"ALIMONY FOR HUSBANDS"

Governor C. C. Young, of California, has signed a bill passed recently by the legislature providing that a needy husband may collect alimony and separate maintenance for himself and children during and after divorce. We are wondering whether this alimony business isn't going a bit too far. Laws encourage marriage, hold the marriage relation sacred and protect the sanctity of the home; and this "alimony for husbands" law is not going to scare out a lot of women from engaging in matrimony. For in true feminine style the good wife will shrug her shoulders and shout to her spouse, "Try and get it!" And we want a framed picture of the judge or jury that will have stamina (or shall we call it nerve) enough to make her pay.
