WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE RECIPE

STRAWBERRY SHORT CAKE

Mrs. Wm. Kruger, Tigard Oregon.
2 cups flour—4 teaspoons baking powder.
4 tablespoons Wesson Oil
3 tablespoons sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
1/4 cup milk
1 egg.
Take two boxes strawberries, wash mash 10 minutes before serving.

CREAM PIE

By Mrs. D. S. Sharpe, Multnomah, Oregon.

Take 2 pints milk, 1 1/2 cups sugar, put on stove, let come to a boil. Take whites of 5 eggs, beat and pour milk and sugar over while boiling hot, then add to this, already mixed, the yolks of the eggs. 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon butter, flavor to suit. This makes 2 pies. Pour into pie tin lined with crust and bake.

SPONGE CAKE

Mrs. J. E. Mann, Aloha, Ore.
6 eggs, beat whites and yolks separately, add 1/2 cup sugar to each, put together, fold in 1 cup of pastry flour, add flavoring to taste, pour in unbuttered angel food pan, bake in slow oven 45 minutes.

HARD SAUCE

Mrs. C. A. King, Beaverton
3 tablespoons butter, 6 tablespoons powdered sugar, 1/2 tablespoon cream 1/2 white egg, nutmeg.
Cream butter, add sugar gradually. When light and creamy add the unbeaten egg and the cream a drop at a time. Season highly, add a few drops of lemon juice or extract, if desired.

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
