WORK STARTED ON VIADUCT

Men Working 17 Hours A Day So As To Hasten Work

MUST BE DONE AUG 1

Nearly 100 Men Working on Telephone, Gas Mains, Electric wires Etc. for Four Days

Work was started Friday on the right of way for the viaduct, detour signs erected and part of the highway vacated. Large crews of men were busy changing gas mains telephone and electric wires. Crews of men were digging out the dirt for the approaches on each end of the viaduct for the starting of the concrete forms. At one end the approaches were just in front of Mr. Conger's building and on the other were about 30 feet above Ghormley's Filling Station. The pits were about 12 feet deep, 10 feet wide and 50 feet long. Sheds to house material were also erected.

The detour is very dusty and it is thought that the heavy trucks will soon cut it up making it almost impossible to drive over.

Cars are allowed to park as far on the highway as the Multnomah Shoe Shop.

Moline's Garage is almost cut off from travel but can be reached through Farewell Street, the Copeland Lumber Co., have not as yet moved their office to the new building. Ghormley's Filling Station is entirely cut off from the main artery of travel, but can be reached easily either from the Garden Home road or down the main highway.

The viaduct must be finished by August 1, according to contract.
