ADVERTISING LOWERS COSTS Newspaper advertising in America cost \$235,000,000 last year, a gain of \$15,000,000 over the previous year.

It has been argued that advertising is so much waste, so much added unnecessarily to the cost of the articles sold. In one sense, it is true; if the sales could be made without it, the prices could be just that much less to the consumer.

But the world buys only on information. It travels because it knows where to go, what it can see, how much it will cost. It builds new houses because it reads how other people build and live and enjoy. It dresses in new fabrics because these come to its reading eyes. It is many times cheaper to get all this information by reading than in any other manner. The world would settle down into a jumble of ignorant, unkempt, leave-me-alone provincial units but for what it reads in the advertising columns.—The Manufacturer.

HELP, DON'T HECKLE

The suggestion has appeared here and there in the state press recently, that in each county a taxpayer's league should be organized in the interest of tax reduction or equalization, it is not always clear which. Generally it is stated that the immediate work to be undertaken by such an organization is an examination of the voting records of the representatives of that county in the state legislature. Men elected to represent a portion of the Oregon public are then to be grilled and interrogated, and be probed and x-rayed as to purpose and motive in voting the way they did on appropriation bills and other legislative matters.

Threats of this character, or the hauling of honest, intelligent representatives before an inquisitorial body of their neighbors, constitute an admirable method of leeching out of men otherwise confident as to their own judgement, the last trace of independence of thought or action. If developed in this spirit of fault-finding these taxpayers' leagues can cause more harm than good. While if they are developed for broader purposes of study of problems of administration of local government, with gumption and intelligence enough to analyse tax purposes without prejudice or rancor, these leagues can serve a commendable purpose. But help, don't heckle the legislators. Some naturally cower before the spectre of public opinion, and submerge their better judgment in doing so.—Oregon Voter.

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
