With our new recognition of the value of sunlight to life, the efforts toward abatement will no longer be made up of actions that are merely emotional and spectacular. The whole movement will be based on prevention rather than cure. Only non-smoking plants will be allowed to go on, and this will save the great amount of money now wasted on temporizing. Clean air will be demanded, and few will argue that the price is too high.

"Then the universal use of manufactured gas for heating becomes an actuality, and such an outcome is consciousness with respect to the value of sunshine. Plenty of sunlight means better milk and more nourishing vegetables; it means fewer cases of malnutrition, rickets, general debility, tuberculosis, colds and nervous disorders, and it also means a very considerable reduction in the cost of living," declared Floyd W.
