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MOCK DUCK

Take a flank steak, make stuffing as for chicken. Put it in steak, roll and sear tightly, sprinkle with flour, put in pan. Put bits of butter on it, a little water in the roasting pan, cover and bake.

PINEAPPLE BAVARIAN CREAM
1 tablespoon gelatine, 1/2 cup water, 1 cup milk, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 pint whipped cream, 1 large can grated pineapple.

Soak gelatine in the water while the milk and sugar come to a boil. Then add gelatine to the hot mixture. Remove from the fire and cool until it coats a spoon. Then add the whipped cream and fruit (drained from the juice). Put into wet mold and let stand several hours or overnight. One pint of crushed fresh strawberries may be used instead of the pineapple.

RHUBARB PIE

(Mrs. W. E. Pegg, Beaverton.)
2 cups rhubarb, 1 cup sugar, pinch of salt, cook with very little water until soft. Then take off fire and add 1 egg yolk, 1 level teaspoonful butter, 4 level tablespoons flour. Set aside to cool. Use double crust.

HERMITS

(Mrs. Wm. Kruger, Tigard)
1 cup wesson oil, 2 cups brown sugar and one white, 6 tablespoons sour milk, 4 eggs, 2 teaspoons soda, 6 cups flour, 3 cups raisins, 1 cup nuts, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, grating orange peel. Drop by spoon on greased pan. Makes 6 dozen.
