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THE HUMANITY OF THE GOLDEN RULE

The human element will always be present. The radio and phonograph bring music to millions of people, but there must be musicians to produce at the central place. What was common labor a few years ago is now the process made possible by the machine. But there must be human power and thought to make the machines. There is no substitute for brain-power.

But these illustrations are in the physical field. They hardly scratch the surface of the greater element of human aspiration. For no machine can make a home, though it can make a house. There is no button to press to get human sympathy. Love is not produced from cog wheels. Kindness does not emanate from a vacuum tank. Friendship is not held fast by brake linings. We often miss the main point in life by thinking that happiness is based on physical comfort, when in truth physical comfort is but an incident of happiness.

True happiness comes from within; from the satisfaction, among other things; of having obeyed the Golden Rule. For surrounded by the luxuries of mountain, desert or sea, among the crowd or on solitary plain, if one has not the feeling that he has done others as he would have others do unto him there can be no real happiness. It is not science or invention, but humanity that holds the world together. It is not the easy bed, but the easy conscience that makes a man happy. And it is our belief that people need to recognize this principle if they expect to give to the world what they owe it, and receive from the world what they believe they have coming.

SPLITTING LEGAL HAIRS

The American Association for the advancement of Atheism is fighting through the courts to have all chaplain appointments discontinued in the army on the ground that the Constitution provides that no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification for public office.

But the A. A. A. will not win. The "religious test" clause merely provides against possible denominational or sectarian discrimination, and was never intended to prohibit the employment of men and women whose services would include the giving of spiritual counsel. And while it can not be said that the United States is a Christian nation from a legal standpoint, it is such a nation from a practical and historic standpoint; and unreservedly it is a nation whose citizens mainly adhere to religion of some kind. It certainly is not an atheist nation such as would give common consent to the claims of the atheist's doctrine.

The atheists are not so much worried over a violation of the Constitution as they are over their attempts to pry loose religion from its foundation and overturn spiritual ideals. In this they seek to use a technical army regulation as a handle.

POULTRY REMINDERS

(From O. A. C. Experiment Station)

Green feed for poultry is cut fine in a feed-cutter and fed in a green feed hopper. In a hopper it stays together and remains succulent much longer than when thrown upon the floor or into the yards and scattered around by the fowls.

A can or barrel large enough to hold a week's supply of grain in each poultry pen, saves time and labor. A slanting top prevents the fowl from roosting on it.

Poultry meat is canned by many Oregon housewives and with simple methods a good tasting meat preserve is made. By the following method a 2-pound dressed fowl gives about one pint of solid meat and one pint of jelly.

The raw meat is taken off the bones and cut up, so it will go into the jars easily. It is packed tightly in cleaned, tested, glass jars, to one inch of the top. A half teaspoonful salt and seasoning is added, but no water. Cover with new rubbers are placed lightly on the jars. Then the jars are put into a tightly covered container, like a pressure canner of steam cooker, but a wash boiler or sap bucket will also do. The water is heated to boiling point and the meat sterilized 4 to 5 hours. Before taking the cans from the sterilizer, they are tightly sealed. When these jars are stored in a dark and cool place the meat remains good for a long time.

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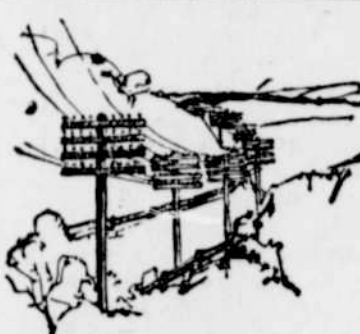
