## GLARING HEADLIGHT TO BE ELIMINATED

"The most dangerous situation facing the motorist today is the glaring headlight and spotlight" said A. E. Shearer, of the Oregon State Motor Association. "Visitors from all coast states comment upon the dangerous condition attending night driving in Oregon."

"The last two sessions of the Legislature have attempted to correct this evil and the second effort became a law only a few days ago. "There was a decided difference of opinion as to the advisability and efficiency of the law as passed by the 1925 session and as a consequence it was not enforced and motorists disregarded it. The law as passed by the last legislature is one on which all authorities agreed and it is highly desired that this law be enforced by all law enforcement agencies."

"Night driving in Oregon has been given a bad name in neighboring states, but if the present law is enforced, this condition should rapidly be remedied."

## MASHED POTATO CHOCOLATE CAKE

Very Moist, Will Keep Long Time (Mrs. Ida Cutting, Tigard)

Two-third cups butter; 2 cups sugar; 1 cup hot rice potatoes; 2 cups sifted flour; 2 teaspoons baking powder; 4 eggs; 1 cup chopped nuts; 1/2 cup milk; 2 oz. chocolate; (2 squares unsweetened chocolate); 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves.

Cream butter, sugar, hot potatoes, milk, well beaten eggs, sifted flour, spices, chopped nuts, tablespoon vanilla, any kind of white icing.

## GOOD COOKIES

1 egg; 1 cup sugar; 3/4 cup shortening; 1 cup milk; 2 teaspoons baking powder; 2 cups flour, flavoring, add more flour if needed to roll out. Can use raisins, coconut, or nuts, on top, or allow to cool and then frost. Delicious with tea.

## SPRING SALAD

1 cup raw carrots ground; 1 cup grated pineapple; 1 package lemon jello. Use only 1 cup hot water to dissolve jello, when it starts to congeal add pineapple and carrots. Serve on lettuce leaf, use mayonnaise or cooked dressing.

## SUNDAY NIGHT SUPPER

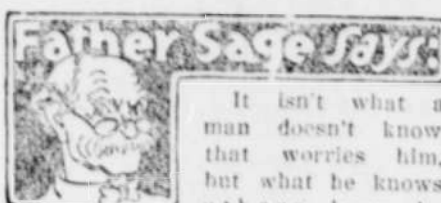

## TO HOLDERS OF SECOND LIBERTY LOAN BONDS

EXCHANGE OFFERING OF NEW TREASURY BONDS

Notice is given of a new offering of UNITED STATES TREASURY BONDS, dated June 15, 1927, and bearing interest from that date at the rate of 3 1/2 per cent. The bonds will mature in twenty years, but may be called for redemption after sixteen years.

Second Liberty Loan bonds will be accepted in exchange at par. Accrued interest on the Second Liberty bonds offered for exchange will be paid as of June 15, 1927.

Second Liberty Loan bonds have been called for payment on November 15, 1927, and will cease to bear interest on that date. Holders of such bonds who desire to take advantage of the exchange offer should consult their bank or trust company at once. The exchange privilege will be available for a limited period only, and may expire about June 15th.

Further information may be obtained from banks or trust companies, or from any Federal Reserve Bank.
