Before the war they called us "mollycoddles." But what about the boys who went over the top? What about Lindburgh, Chamberlain, Byrd, and even the Catalina and English channel swimmers, men who went over the earth across continents, and breaking endurance and speed records? Are men braver now, or is human life valued less than in past generations and ancient times? The answer probably is that present-day achievements are not more hazardous, but simply more spectacular, and combined with mechanical perfection and rapid communication they stand out more prominently in the minds of a greater number of people. At any rate, the romance of adventure is not dead.
