PULLMAN HEATED BY GAS BOILER

The most recent application of the gas-fired furnace has been developed by the Wabash Railroad, to keep Pullman cars warm.

The railroad was faced with the problem of supplying heat for a car which laid over in Chicago for two hours each evening. A steam locomotive could have done the heating, but only at an exorbitant cost, and the local gas company consulted.

A gas-fired steam boiler with automatic heat control, was installed in the basement of the passenger station, from this a pipe was carried to the tracks where the car stopped. The gas-fired boiler now supplies steam to the Pullman for the two hours each day that heat is required, at the end of which the gas is turned off.

The installation, which is believed to be the first of its kind, is reported to be both economical and efficient.

RECIPE (Mrs. Mann)

Try using heavy sour cream instead of shortening for your biscuits. Two level teaspoon baking powder, pinch soda to each cup flour, sifted, add enough sour cream to make dough right consistency knead lightly. Roll lightly, have biscuit pan hot and well greased. Also try adding a well beaten egg to your liquid, rolling, sprinkling with sugar, butter, cinnamon, making into long roll. Cut into inch slices, cut side up. Bake in biscuit oven.

DUTCH VEAL ROAST (Mrs. R. E. Hanna, Beaverton.)

Roll roast in flour, sear, add 1 onion, 1 cup vinegar over roast, bake. Serve with dressing made of bread crumbs, onion, and a little sage.

OVER NIGHT NUT COOKIES (Mrs. H. W. McDonald, Tigard)

3 eggs; 3/4 cup lard; 3/4 cup sugar; 4 1/2 cups flour; 1 cup chopped nuts; 2 scant teaspoons soda; 1 teaspoon vanilla. Makes 100 cookies. Set over night, slice and bake in the morning.

GOOD CANDY

1/2 cup mashed potatoes; 1 egg white; 3 teaspoons vanilla, beat in powdered sugar; 1/2 cup walnuts; 3/4 cup coconut. Put in ice box 24 hours, slice.
