

THIS IS THE WAY THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS AND MEASURES WILL APPEAR ON THE OFFICIAL BALLOT

Referred to the People by the Legislative Assembly

Submitted by the Legislature—Repeal of Negro, Chinaman and Mulatto Suffrage Section of Constitution—Purpose: To repeal Section 6, of the constitution of Oregon, which is invalid because in conflict with the United States constitution. Said section attempts to deny the right of suffrage to negroes, Chinamen and mulattoes, regardless of their citizenship.

300 Yes. I vote for the amendment.
301 No. I vote against the amendment.

Submitted by the Legislature—Portland School District Tax Levy Amendment—Purpose: To authorize any school district having 100,000 or more population to include, each year, the increase in tax levy last specifically authorized by the legal voters of the district for the support operation and maintenance of its schools in determining the amount of taxes that may be levied.

302 Yes. I vote for the amendment.
303 No. I vote against the amendment.

Submitted by the Legislature—Criminal Information Amendment—Purpose: To provide that if any person appears before any judge of the circuit court and waives indictment for the commission of any crime or misdemeanor such person may be charged in the circuit court with any such crime or misdemeanor on information filed by the district attorney.

304 Yes. I vote for the amendment.
305 No. I vote against the amendment.

Submitted by the Legislature—Legislators' Pay Amendment—Purpose: To fix the compensation of members of the legislature at not to exceed \$10 a day, during regular and extra sessions thereof, such pay not to exceed in the aggregate \$400 for per diem allowance for any one regular session. The presiding officers to receive additional compensation equal to 50 per centum of their diem allowance as members.

306 Yes. I vote for the amendment.
307 No. I vote against the amendment.

Submitted by the Legislature—Voters' Registration Amendment—Purpose: To require voters at elections, not otherwise provided for by the constitution, to be duly registered prior thereto in the manner provided by law, as a qualification to be entitled to vote at such election, and to ratify an act passed by the thirty-fourth legislative assembly purporting to carry into effect this amendment, if adopted by the people.

308 Yes. I vote for the amendment.
309 No. I vote against the amendment.

Submitted by the Legislature—State and County Officers Salary Amendment—Purpose: To amend article XIII of the constitution of the state of Oregon so as to require that the compensation of all state and county elective officers shall be provided by law, but no salary of any such officer shall be increased during the term of office for which he shall have been elected.

310 Yes. I vote for the amendment.
311 No. I vote against the amendment.

Submitted by the Legislature—City and County Consolidation Amendment—Purpose: To authorize any city of over 100,000 population situated wholly within one county to consolidate by its charter with any or all other public corporations of said county. Such consolidation may include territory without the city, but within the county. Such charter must be submitted separately to the electors of said city and of the territory proposed to be consolidated with it, and to be adopted must receive a majority vote in each. If so approved notice thereof with copy of such charter shall be sent secretary of state. Legislature shall provide for government of any remainder of county.

313 No. I vote against the amendment.

Submitted by the Legislature—Veterans' Memorial and Armory Amendment—Purpose: To authorize any county having 200,000 or more population to issue bonds not exceeding one-fourth of 1 per cent of assessed valuation of property therein to provide a site, and for constructing, furnishing and equipping a veterans' memorial building and armory building in any city having 100,000 or more population and one or more organized veterans' units, and one or more fully organized national guard units; and to levy annual taxes free from the 5 per cent limitation, of not exceeding one-half mill on each dollar or assessed valuation to provide for payment of such bonds with interest.

314 Yes. I vote for the amendment.
No. I vote against the amendment.

Submitted by the Legislature—State Tax Limitation Amendment—Purpose: To authorize the state to levy upon property in December, 1928, an amount of tax not exceeding \$3,500,000, plus 6 per centum thereof, less the estimated collections of income taxes during 1929, and in any year thereafter not to exceed said amount with any authorized increase thereof previously levied, plus 6 per centum thereof, less estimated collections of income taxes during the ensuing year; the constitutional limitations applying both to general property and income taxes, but not to millage levies authorized by the people, nor to taxes levied for payment of bonded indebtedness, or interest thereon, nor to other revenues.

Submitted by the Legislature—Income Tax Bill—Purpose: To levy annually a progressive state income tax upon net incomes of persons and corporations resident and non-resident in the state, from every source within the state; exempting from net income of a single person, \$1,000 married person, head of family, or husband and wife together, \$2,000, and for each child or dependent under certain conditions, \$400; corporations, \$2,000 each; and submitting to the legal voters the question whether the state shall raise by taxation during 1928, \$2,000,000 in excess of the 6 per cent limitation provided in section 11 of article XI of the constitution.

REFERENDUM ORDERED BY PETITION OF THE PEOPLE

Referred by L. B. Smith, 419 Oregon building, Portland, Oregon.—Property Assessment and Taxation Enforcement Bill—Purpose: To authorize State Tax Commission to supervise and control administration of assessment and tax laws, of county assessors, equalization boards and other taxing officers; to examine, test and correct assessors' work, assess omitted property reassessed improperly valued property, direct county equalization boards to raise or lower valuations; to authorize assessors and Tax Commission to require production of books, records, and sworn information

concerning capital, assets, liabilities, earnings, expenses, taxes, and amount and value of property; authorizing appeals from county boards to State Commission and from latter to courts; punishing failure to furnish such information and other violations with heavy penalties.

320 Yes. I vote for the proposed law.
321 No. I vote against the proposed law.

Referred by the Nestucca Local of the Tillamook County Fishermen's Union, Tillamook, Oregon; H. W. Southmayd, President, Woods, Oregon; John T. McLaughlin, Secretary, Woods, Oregon; and by Cloverdale Grange No. 355; G. D. Sanders, Master, Cloverdale, Oregon; Adella Jensen, Secretary, Hebo, Oregon.—Nestucca Bay Fish Closing Bill—Purpose: To prohibit the taking or fishing for salmon or other food fish in Nestucca Bay and its tributaries at any time, by any means whatsoever, except with hook and line, commonly called angling; said Bay and tributaries having been heretofore open to commercial fishing below tide water during certain periods of the year.

THE MEMORIAL ARMORY BUILDING

Attention of every patriotic citizen in the State of Oregon is called to two measures which will appear on the ballot at the special election, on June 28.

These two measures, if approved by the voters, will open the way to construction in Portland of a Memorial Building, dedicated to the Oregon veterans of all wars.

Vote 314 X Yes.
Veterans' Memorial Armory Amendment.
One of these measures is an amendment to the State Constitution, authorizing Multnomah county to bond itself to provide funds necessary for that purpose.

Vote 324 X Yes.
Veterans' Memorial Armory Building.

The other measure is a Legislative bill referred to the voters of Multnomah county only, which specifies the details concerning construction, operation and maintenance of the building, authorizes a bond issue by the county of approximately \$900,000, to pay the total cost of construction, and levies a tax of one-fourth of a mill for the retirement of the bonds.

The first measure will be voted on by the entire state. Thus the voters of the State are asked merely to permit Portland and Multnomah county to tax themselves for this purpose.

The second measure will be voted on by Multnomah County alone. Both of these measures, therefore, must receive the affirmative vote of Multnomah County electors if the plan for the Memorial is to be carried out.

It will be built and administered under the direction of the General Staff of the Oregon National Guard, an administrative body already existing and experienced in this type of construction. The Board of Trustees to operate the building will consist of representatives of the organizations occupying same, civic organizations, and governmental agencies.

It will provide a home for veterans' organizations and their auxiliaries, many of whom are now dissipating their financial resources by payment of high rentals.

It will provide a memorial to the dead of all wars and a repository for flags, trophies, sacrifices and achievements.

It will provide adequate quarters for the National Guard organizations of the city. The present Armory is entirely inadequate and is a tremendous fire hazard. Originally built in 1889 for four companies, it is now housing eighteen.

It will provide a civic improvement capable of handling the largest conventions and other public gatherings. We spend thousands of dollars every year in advertising Oregon, yet are compelled to turn away large conventions because we have no adequate facilities for handling them. The drill hall of the proposed building can be converted into an auditorium capable of seating over 15,000 people.

It is contemplated that the building shall be self-supporting, thus eliminating annual County appropriations for maintenance of from \$12,000 to \$20,000.

The combination of Memorial and Armory is not incongruous. Veterans' organizations are transient in character, since they exist only so long as the veterans are alive. The combination provides a permanent organization to maintain and operate the memorial long after the present veterans' organizations are dissolved through the action of time. The design of a building suitable for Armory purposes lends itself readily to the display of tablets, flags, colors, trophies, historical relics, and other features of commemorative character, while administration by the National Guard assures revenue for the proper care of such features in the event that revenues derived from the building are inadequate for the purpose.

GOLDEN WEDDING CAKE
(Mrs. H. W. McDonald, Tigard)

1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup butter, mixed, 3 eggs—drop in, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon allspice, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon lemon, 1 heaping teaspoon baking powder, 2 cups flour.

1 cup raisins 1/2 cup flour, chop, put back into cup—add small teaspoon soda, fill cup with hot water. Wo this when starting cake—then add raisin mixture before putting in flour.

BEAN SOUP
4 Plates

1 cup beans, 2 quarts water, 1/2 cup Wesson oil, 3 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 2 teaspoons cream of tartar, pinch of salt. Put in ice box over night, slice in morning and bake.

OVER NIGHT COOKIES

3 cups flour, 2 cups brown sugar, 1/2 cup Wesson oil, 3 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 2 teaspoons cream of tartar, pinch of salt. Put in ice box over night, slice in morning and bake.

Left over veal, lamb or beef are good scalloped with spinach. Equal parts of cooked spinach and cooked meat are good used together. To about two cups of spinach and two cups of cooked meat make a cup and a half of a well seasoned medium thick white sauce. Place a layer of chopped spinach in the bottom of an oiled baking dish and over this place a layer of meat. Cover with a layer of white sauce and then repeat the spinach, meat and white sauce. Cover with buttered crumbs. Bake until the dish is heated through and the crumbs are brown.
