MYSTERIOUS SHOT
THROUGH WINDOW

Goes Through Pane Glass,
Smashes Frame Cracks
Another Pane.

MAY HAVE BEEN BOYS

Had Just Sat Down to Dinner Else
Some One Might Have Been
Killed

An early call to dinner probably
saved some one's life last Sunday
at the home of J. D. Stewart, on
Walnut avenue, at Multnomah. A
party of friends had been sitting by
the window talking and Mrs. Stewart
called them to come to dinner, as
they intended to attend church serv-
ices at the Baptist church at Cap-
itol Hill. They had just sat down to
the table in one corner of the large
living room, when a crash of splin-
tered glass caused them to jump to
their feet. The bullet went through
the glass, hit the side of the sash,
cracked another pane, hit the side
of the window frame, flew across
the room 18 feet, hit the bookcase,
at an angle and the bullet dropped
to the floor. An oil painting hang-
ing on the wall was tipped to one
side, but not injured and only a
small splinter knocked off the book-
case. The bullet was a .38 and had
evidently been fired by boys in the
ravine across from the house.

If the bullet had not been deflected
by hitting the sash it might have
even hit some one at the table, for
it was at the other end of the room
opposite the bookcase.

Those sitting at the table were:
Mrs. Ashton, of Capitol Hill, Mr.
and Mrs. Ralph A. Harold, nephew
of Mrs. Stewart, who had just re-
turned from a honeymoon trip to
Salem, and Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Ste-
wart.

After the crash the men ran out-
side the house but could not find
any one in sight who even knew of
the firing. The neighbors had not
seen or heard any shots fired.

If the accident was due to care-
lessness of boys, parents should in-
vestigate and see that it does not
happen again.

EARLY SETTLERS IN ALOHA

C. A. Haulenbeck started the lum-
ber yard in Aloha nine years ago
and then sold out to Matt King.

date, all-glass service station.

Rasmus Rasmussen, David Wheeler
and E. Butler all had donation land
claims here.

Mr. and Mrs. A. Clark lived where
Mr. Gauntt now lives. School was
taught in this house for a while. It
became dilapidated and finally was
burned down and a new house built.
The school house was built 12
years ago and only two teachers
were employed. The first officers of
the P. T. A. were Mrs. H. Hearsey,
president; Mrs. H. Lindeman, sec-
retary; and Mrs. H. T. Sidwell,
treasurer. The children always made
wonderful exhibits at the Hillsboro
fair every year.
