## MAPLEWOOD.

Far too little pasture grass seed is grown in the Pacific northwest, according to G. R. Hyslop, professor of farm crops at the Oregon experiment station. Growers have sent perfectly good money year after year to the east and abroad for pasture seed when it might well have been grown here. They could produce enough white clover, an expensive item of mixture, to supply all local needs and to ship out a surplus.

In so far as sugar content and yield of Oregon sugar beets in concerned numerous places in the state from the coast to Snake river will grow sugar beets of yield and quality good enough for the factory, reports the experiment station after nearly 40 years of trial. But more than soil and climate are necessary to agricultural production of sugar beets. For successful manufacture there must be an assured volume of raw materials every season.

Crude powdered sulphur 99 per cent pure is the most concentrated form to use as Oregon soil fertilizer, says the experiment station, saving freight and cartage. Availability for plant food is in proportion to the fineness or surface area, so to be properly effective it is so ground as to pass through a sieve with a 30-inch mesh. On heavier soils 34 pounds to an acre every four years is effective. On sandier lands 60 to 75 pounds every two or three years now seems the better practice.

## QUICK CELERY SOUP

One pint cleaned celery stocks ground, 1 small onion, ground, 1 quart boiling water or soup stock, 1 pint milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon Karo, 2 tablespoons oil (Mazola), 2 tablespoons corn starch, 1 egg (optional). Boil the celery in the water 25 minutes. Add the seasoning and milk and when boiling, thicken with the oil and corn starch creamed together. Pour boiling hot onto a beaten egg and serve with croutons.

## COTTAGE PUDDING

Cream, 1-3 cup butter, add gradually 1 cup sugar and 1 or 2 eggs, well beaten. Sift together 1 1/4 cups flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder. Add to first mixture alternately with 1-2 cup milk. Bake 20 to 30 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve with sauce.

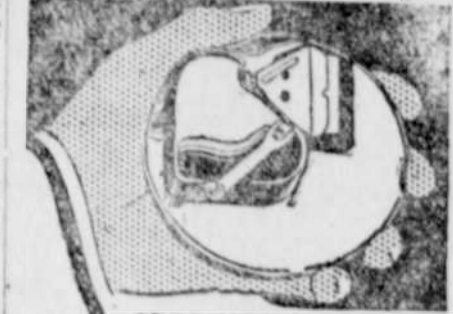
## HEALTH MUFFINS

Four cups bran, 1 cup rolled oats put through food chopper, 1 1/2 cups flour, 2 tablespoons corn starch, 5 teaspoons baking powder, 1 cup raisins put through food chopper, 2 teaspoons salt, 1 cup Karo, 1 egg, 2 cups milk. Combine the ingredients as enumerated. Beat well, transfer to muffin tins, greased and bake 25 to 30 minutes in a moderate oven. This will make 18 medium sized muffins. They will keep several days, or may be served split, toasted or buttered.

## GREEN TOMATO PIE

Peel tomatoes, slice thin, put a little flour in bottom pie crust and 1/2 cup sugar. Finish filling pie with tomatoes. A little more flour and a little more than 1/2 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons vinegar, a little butter and cinnamon.

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
