Viaduct Finished as  
Soon as Possible

LOSING MONEY EVERY DAY

Falsework on Viaduct Nearly Ready  
For the Pouring of Concrete  
Road on Side of Bridge

Will it ever be completed? is the question being asked by Multnomah merchants about the viaduct. So far only one fill has been made on the west side of the bridge, but the false work for the bridge paving, up to the place where it crosses the railroad track, is nearly completed. The 12 cement pillars on which the bridge proper rests, have been poured and it is the thought that the east fill on the approach to the bridge will be filled with gravel and dirt this week. A road will be cut through from the 15-cent store down beside the bridge so that it will connect with 33rd street and a road leading back of the depot.

## ST. MARYS HOME TO HAVE ADDITION BUILT

Will Cost \$18,000 and will  
be Completed in 2 Months

Ground Floor to be used for Playroom,  
Second Floor, 2 Classrooms,  
Third floor, Dormitory

Contracts for a three-story addition to St. Marys home, near Beaverton, will be awarded early this week, according to Jacobberger & Smith, Portland architects, designing the \$18,000 structure. Construction will be started immediately, with the view of having the building completed within two months.

The addition is to be at the east end of the present buildings. It will be of concrete and clay tile construction, with a stucco exterior. The building will occupy a 26 x 74-foot area.

Plans provide for the use of the ground floor as a large playroom, the second floor for two class rooms and the third for two dormitory rooms.
