BIG MEETING FRIDAY NIGHT

WILL ROAD GO AROUND?

Will the road go around Beaverton? is the question puzzling the Citizens and Merchants.

A meeting has been called for Friday evening in the I. O. O. F. hall to discuss the Canyon road problem and it is hoped that a large crowd will be in attendance. Several property owners affected by the widening of the highway were present at the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce held Tuesday evening and gave their side of the question of damages to their business. A. B. Clements was present and took exception to the article which appeared in one of the daily papers stating that a service station in the center of Beaverton demanded \$25,000 for a right of way. He said that his proposition was that he would buy the lot next to his station and move his station back if they award him \$8,000, as J. E. Kelly, at Sylvan, was reported to have been awarded \$8,500 and his store was only moved 30 feet back. Considerable time was spent in discussing the question.

Otto Erickson was appointed to confer with State Highway Commissioner Gates. It was stated that surveyors had been at work since Saturday surveying a new route to Hillsboro which would eliminate Beaverton, Aloha, and Keedville, that at no time did the surveyors plan to touch the Highway until a few miles out of Hillsboro. Another plan discussed was that 6 feet could be taken off the north side of Broadway, making width for three lanes of traffic.

Clement Gives His Side of Question

In an interview Wednesday afternoon A. B. Clements said: In the Sunday Journal there appeared the following paragraph on the proposed widening of Canyon road in Washington county: "A service station in the city limits of Beaverton demanded \$25,000 for a right of way. Some other Beaverton property owners made demands almost as unreasonable."

"The undersigned has reason to believe that he is the proprietor of the service station mentioned above and has been offered \$5,500 for the destruction of his building and business and the taking of about one half of the business lot on which he is now located. When the viewers were showing where the new lines of the proposed road would come and asked what damages would be expected, they were told—to replace the building, and equipment and surface of the lot on a vacant lot directly in the rear, which would then become the corner and would be a similar location to that now occupied.

"The viewers suggested the above solution as being a less expensive way of settling with me than by paying damages for the destruction of my business or property. Respectfully

COHOES

A gas engineering feat believed to be without precedent has recently been successfully completed in Cohoes, N. Y., by the laying of 9,000 feet of welded eight inch steel gas mains across the business part of the town at the bottom of various water power canals and ducts instead of in the usual trenches.

Twenty foot lengths of pipe were first welded together to reach from the gas plant of the Cohoes Power and Light Corporation to the Champlain Canal. From this canal a short trench was dug to a second waterway, and from the second to a third, as much as 1,500 feet of the welded main being dragged in to position at one time. The pipe line conformed to bends and changes of level without breaking, and upon completion successfully stood a test of 100-lb. pressure.

New York state possesses another unusual gas main in the six-inch line between Geneva and Auburn. This pipe burrows under Kondig Creek, Silver Creek and Sucker Brook and crosses over the Barge Canal upon a special steel bridge between Cayuga and Seneca Lakes.
