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UNFAVORABLE COMMENT

Considerable unfavorable comment has been made regarding the excessive damages asked by property owners along the projected route of the Canyon road between Beaverton and the Multnomah county line. In some instances there may appear sufficient evidence to warrant such comment, but we have reason to believe that the people of this district as a whole are heartily behind this project and are not unreasonable to the extent of having the highway rerouted to some other location.

It is the same old story, whether projecting new highways, railroad right of ways, streets, etc., there is a difference of opinion between the parties concerned as to valuation of land to be used, but these differences are usually adjusted sooner or later by a thorough understanding of the importance of the undertaking to their respective holdings or through condemnation proceedings.

In the meantime we have gained front page publicity in the newspapers of our neighboring cities where we are enlightened of the fact that through excessive and unreasonable damages asked we are about to lose the highway as originally routed to a point just north of us. The inference is that we are practically driving the highway from our city because of "Shylock methods" used by property owners in and around Beaverton.

This is not the best publicity in the world, but is to be expected where matters pertaining to valuation of land is the cause.

We have every reason to believe that after careful consideration has been given by all concerned, that the people of this district will be found as reasonable in their demands as those in any other.

THE SYSTEM OR THE SYMPATHIZERS

Just because the processes of law have been carried on in the commonwealth of Massachusetts, and just because a couple of radicals happened to be the defendants in the case, it became necessary to physically guard the American foreign embassies the trial judge and governor in Massachusetts, and even the President of the United States. Imagine such a mental condition of affairs! With the exception of the judge and Governor Fuller, none of these officials had any more to do with the case than any reader of this newspaper. Sacco and Vanzetti must be avenged, say the sympathizers.

But why, for example, is it necessary to place police guards around the person of Ambassador Myron T. Herrick in France, simply because in Massachusetts two anarchists were condemned to death after seven years of trials, appeals, reviews and practically every legal process known to the law and some that have scarcely been used before? Such demonstration as of bombs and threats strike against constitutional government in no uncertain terms.

Sacco and Vanzetti had the advantage of their lawful rights. But even if they had not had full justice, such fact should not be seized upon by anarchistic sympathizers to foment resistance to law and organized government. And as for mere radicals, if the system of trial by jury is wrong or not the best system, there is an honest and a lawful and humanitarian method to seek its change. That method is peaceful discussion and the ballot. No bomb placed outside the door or in the mails of an official is going to save anybody from the judgement of a court of law, nor is it going to upset civilization's highest and best known system of determining questions of law and fact; nor, above all is it going to scare anybody.

If there are those among us or on foreign shores who do not like the form of government under which we live, the worst and poorest and least effective way to go about changing it is to encourage or engage in lawlessness. Such cowardly and surreptitious acts only

intensify the determination of law-abiding citizens to stand by the system which they have duly constituted and put in force and effect by the mandates of conscience and justice.

CHURCH ADVERTISING

It has been only during the last few years that churches generally have used the press in the form of paid advertising. This has not been because church leaders and pastors did not appreciate the value of the paid advertisement; rather because it was not thought within the scope of religious activity to emulate the commercial world. The possibilities disclose themselves by chance advertisements which, like all good advertising, brought results. Now it is considered highly ethical and thoroughly compatible with church practices—in fact almost universally necessary to use display advertising for special services and even for the routine weekly worship.

The reason for this evolution from the more fundamental methods of promoting church attendance is clear. The function of divine worship is something truly set apart from the work-a-day world and far removed from material humdrum. Its prime object is to call people to the recognition of soul. But it has been found that the business of getting people into the houses of worship is indeed a business, and calls for methodical and continuous efforts. To greater or less extent, the church must compete with the theatre, baseball, radio, vacations, the "sleepy Sunday morning," the motor car, and last but not least, indifference. Church advertising, therefore, was as inevitable as it is commendable.

The question of finance is perhaps a hindering factor in some instances, and this certainly is a legitimate excuse. But in many cases this hindrance is being lessened by the press itself, taking into consideration the non-profit and organizations as well as their benign influence for community good.

VACATION TO ORDER
