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THE PROGRESS OF LABOR

On Monday, September 5, some will merely try to enjoy another holiday. But the great majority of people will center their minds on that ancient and honorable institution known as Labor. What has Labor done to promote the well-being of humanity?

As represented by federations and unions Labor has a record more to be proud of than to be ashamed of in its efforts to lift the worker from a mere circumstance of servitude to a condition of comparative independence. On the other hand, Labor as an institution of production, and embracing all those who toil with hands, can look to forces even beyond its own control for whatever benefits have come to it. Not only have working men and women placed themselves in positions of higher respect thru organization, and co-operation, but labor-saving devices have been the means of dignifying labor to a point of mental control of the machine.

Through all this the organized worker has suffered from his own mistakes, and has also borne the brunt and odium of radicalism and agitation on the part of his associates. But another promising element in the evolution of industry is that many corporations and employers have developed souls. To work in the Twentieth Century is not to slave. And should the soul of one's employer be a little warped or undergrown, there is increasing opportunity to find another.

Many things contribute to this possibility. Improved methods of transportation, night schools, extension courses, trade schools, Americanization work, day nurseries, social and health service, facilities for recreation, efficiency of management labor protection laws, accident compensation and insurance, combined with better understandings in industrial relations—all these mainly independent of the concerted and continuous demands for shorter hours and higher wages have had a wholesome and lasting effect on the present status of labor.

Few begrudge these aids to the man and the family of the man who toils. Many rejoice. All benefit more or less. Perhaps the most unfortunate part of the whole theme is that agriculture, for some unknown and as yet undiscovered cause, has never been able to so fully share the blessings of betterment as has its twin sister known as industry. He who labors, deserves. He who co-operates, receives.
