Miss Mildred Dunlap Leads Spanish Specialty Dance in "Kid Boots," Now Playing in Eastern Cities

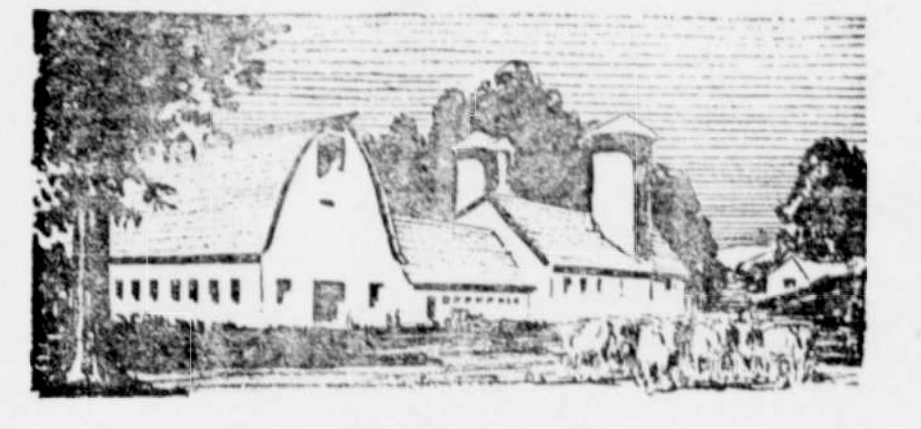
