PEDIGREE COCKERALS

AT FRENCH RANCH

Mrs. C. B. French has some pedigree Leghorn cockerals for sale on her ranch 2 miles east of Beaverton which were shipped to her last spring from the Egg and Apple Farm at Treman, N. Y. They are all from trap nested hens of 30 years breeding, who produced from 200 to 300 eggs. She has their pedigree list at her home. They are both registered and certified. Prof. Rice, of Cornell university is the proprietor of this Egg and Apple Farm.

UNIVERSITY PRINTERS SELECT WORK OF JOAQUIN MILLER

(Special)—"Joaquin, et al," the first published volume of poems by Joaquin Miller, has been selected as the work of the advanced class in printing at the University of Oregon. Under the direction of Dr. John Henry Nash, noted printer of San Francisco, who is a member of the faculty of the school of journalism, and Robert C. Hall, superintendent of the University press, the students will set up type by hand, and print the book.

The selection of the volume was made by E. E. Brodie, Oregon City, Dr. Nash, R. W. Sawyer, Bend, and Earl C. Brownlee, Forest Grove. These men constitute the committee that has charge of the work made possible by donations subscribed by the leading newspapermen of the state.

The book, which contains many of the noted poet's best works, is now very rare, and a copy was finally found here in the library of George Melvin Miller, brother of Joaquin Miller. It is a small, beautifully bound and printed book, and is dedicated to Mr. Miller's parents. It was set up and printed by Carter and Himes of Portland in 1899. George H. Himes, now curator of the state historical museum, is still living.

The volume is the second to be turned out by the advanced class. Last year "Education and the State" by the late President Prince L. Campbell was the selection. Only a few copies are printed to be distributed to the donors of the fine arts printing fund and to important libraries.

Two Acres in Dahlias

A beautiful bouquet of dahlias were left at the Enterprise office by Mrs. J. R. McDonald whose husband has two acres planted in these gorgeous colored plants. They live on the Canyon road 2 miles east of Beaverton. Mr. McDonald took up the culture as a hobby and liked it so well that now he has thousands of bulbs.

BOOSTERS ARE STRONG FOR BEAUTIFICATION

At the last meeting of the Booster club held Tuesday evening, there was an informal discussion about plans to beautify Beaverton. A communication was ordered sent to the City Council asking that body to pass an ordinance compelling property owners to clean up the streets in front of their respective stores and houses and vacant lots under penalty of a fine.

In the East the native professional animal takers sometimes catch leopard in nooses. The leopard, like the tiger and the panther, has the habit of sharpening its claws on tree trunks. The natives aver that the big cats will preferably use for this purpose a tree that bears claw marks previously made. Accordingly, the animal hunters select such a tree and round and about the trunk set their strong gut snares.

A cheetah secured for hunting must be caught when full grown and accomplished in his knack of pulling down game. Otherwise, no matter to what extent it was trained, it would never acquire the quickness and perception as in the wild state, when it has to obtain for itself each and every meal.

In India these cheetahs may be seen tied to bedsteads and holding a place of their own among their keepers' families. The latter seem not in the least to fear the beasts. The cheetahs are carted to the scene of action with hoods on, and these are removed when the animal is shown the quarry.

Insects Like People

Modern entomologists are now classifying insects according to the same types as those used for classification of human beings. The "asthenic" individual with the lean and hungry look may be found among insects as among people. The chunky, round "pycnic" type is found among beetles, bugs and moths, while grasshoppers, mosquito, walking sticks and dragon flies are "asthenic." The intermediate types dominate among these creatures as among humans, and this group is designated as "athletic." Hygeia Magazine.

Speed Limit of Vision

Two experimenters Dr. P. W. Coburn and F. K. Moss, have measured the eye's speed limit. Your eye moves or a skip-stop system as it sees or reads they say in Popular Science Monthly. After thousands of tests on eleven subjects they found that to distinguish an object the average eye must stand still for about one-seventh of second. No amount of added illumination will speed it up. Most home and factory are not brightly enough lighted to have reached the limit this these tests showed.
