But whether it is a street being paved, a building erected, a hand clasped, a song being sung or a soul being reconstructed, there is a mighty hope for the future if the process is one that makes for lasting and good effects in the days and years that are to come. Sincerity of purpose is one cornerstone to permanency.

THE ETHICS OF THE GOLDEN RULE

(For Golden Rule Sunday)

Though he is said to have denied its limitation, Confucius laid down the Oriental "Golden Rule" to be that so long as a man did nothing to another that he wouldn't want another to do to him, he was doing good.

How splendid is the Christian Golden Rule compared with that of Confucius! One is positive; the other negative. In that distinction is found one great difference between the ethics of the Eastern world and of the Western world civilizations.

"Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." NOT merely "what you don't want people to do to you, don't do to them."

Business, social relations, political action, community cooperation, patriotism and human welfare that are not founded on the affirmative basis of doing positive good, instead of merely refraining from bad, are not fulfilling their destinies.

The Golden Rule has never been improved upon because it is incapable of improvement.

It contains food for thought, fields for idealism, grounds for practical action, a basis for achievement, an opportunity for good.

It was the conclusion—the "therefore"—to that part of the Sermon on the Mount reproving rash judgment.

The Golden Rule has lived because it has been necessary to a humanity prone to selfishness.

Because of its almost universal obedience it has made such occasions as Thanksgiving mean more to families, communities and nations.

It has held homes together and preserved national honor and integrity.

It has withstood wars, trials and tribulations; relieved disasters, cured sickness and corrected sin.

It has tempered justice with mercy; made good Samaritans out of multitudes who, without its benign influence, would have been conquered by their own individualism and ego.

The Golden Rule is a practical rule of action, a beneficial guide to right thinking, the foundation of ethical conduct.

It is neither stone that can crumble, nor flesh that can die, nor notion that can change.

It is a principle for correct living and thinking; it is real and everlasting.

It is not necessary to conclude with "long live the Golden Rule." An exclamation more to the point and purpose is, "LONG LIVE ALL OF US BY IT!"
