B. Leis Writes Valuable Facts on Fruit Growing

To the Editor:

All great men preface their ar-
ticles by telling their readers of
their great achievements but as I
am not interested in politics and
don't want your vote I will have
to dispense with it on account of
space and time suffice it to say
that I never got in the second
reader and what I am writing is
from personal practice in my own
orchards and not from any school
or college where so many go and
get their dope out of books and
not from practice. Now I will as
I said before give you my practical
experience in my own orchard and
if you care by following this sys-
tem I will guarantee you that you
can raise as good fruit as I have
done in my 35 years in the orchard
business as I have many medals
and blue ribbons that I received in
competition with the whole Pacific
Northwest not excluding the world
renowned Hood River Valley, we
have the soil and climate in this
valley that no other place can boast
of, hence it is up to the grower for
nature is always ready to do his
part but the grower must help
nature. Now from the many ques-
tions I am asked by different grow-
ers how I manage my orchard I
will describe briefly how I manage
my orchard. Here is one of the
first questions put to me—How do
you raise such clean apples?—Mine
are always spotty and wormy. The
answer is you expect nature to
do all the work that you should
do. I have tried for more than a
quarter of a century to get our
county on the map as a fruit grow-
ing center but it seems that there
is no interest among our growers
in the fruit industry. I may add
here that some years ago when I
received many premiums for having
the best apples and when the list
of those receiving prizes was printed
there I found (I am giving it to you
as I saw it in print) first, (now
take notice)—B. Leis, Beaverton,
State of Washington. Now would
not that rattle you? It surely did
me. They did not know that there
was such a place as Beaverton in
Oregon.

Now we are talking of a can-
nery which I believe would be a
great thing for Beaverton but we
will have to take better care of
our fruit than we have done in the
past for as a cannery man once
told me "people think if they can
not sell their fruit in the market
they take it home and give it to
the hogs and if the hogs would
not eat it well then take it to the
cannery. Well those days are gone
and they will not return. You must
have absolutely clean fruit if you
expect to do business with a can-
nery. Fruit infested with scale—
those red blotches on apples or
pears are scale (of this more in
my next) or scab black spots on
apples or pears and cracked on one
or all sides this is scab. All this
can be prevented by spraying at
the proper time with lime and sul-
phur solution (more of this in my
next) I may also mention here that

I have been asked to take the job
of Fruit Inspector but have re-
fused because one reason is that I
am manufacturing lime and sulphur
solution and if I should enforce the
spraying law perhaps they would
make the excuse that I wanted to
sell them spray; hence I thought
better to decline the job. Much as
I would like to clean out some of
the old landmarks which surely are
a disgrace to the county and dark
blotch on the owner of such so
called trees and I can assure some
of my friends if they liked it or
not I would not use a hatchet like
the father of our country is ac-
credited with but a big ax and a
seven-foot saw and I would be
within the law as there is a law
that all infested trees should be
destroyed by the fruit inspector.

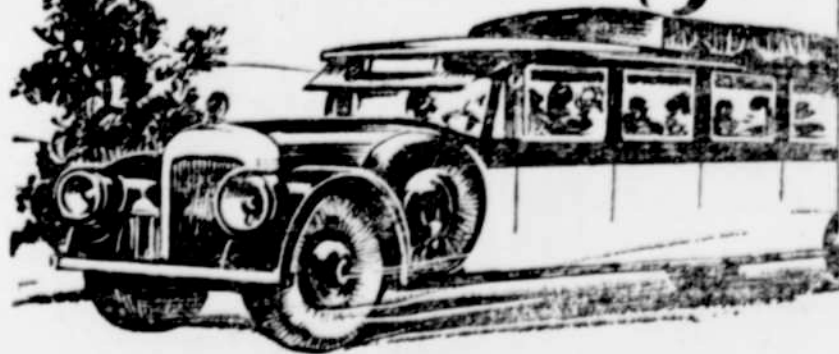
