RECIPES

Salmon Cakes

Take a can of salmon and mix
with 1 beaten egg, add a cupful of
bread crumbs and a tablespoon of
softened butter; season with salt
and pepper; pour into small cakes
and fry in hot fat; serve garnished
with slivers of sour pickle.

Boston Brown Bread

One cup flour, 1 cup corn meal, 1
cup graham flour, 3/4 teaspoon soda,
1 teaspoon salt, 3/4 cup molasses, 2
cups sour milk or 1 1/4 cups sweet
milk or water.

Cabbage Slaw

Put the cabbage through food
grinder, using coarse knife; then
season with salt, pepper and sugar
to taste; take 2 tablespoons of
vinegar in a glass and add enough
canned milk to make a thick cream;
stir constantly; pour cream over the
cabbage and stir in; serve on let-
tuce leaves.

Egg Noodles

One egg well beaten, 2 tablespoons
cold water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, flour
enough to mix firm; beat egg, then
add cold water and salt; mix in
enough flour for a firm dough; roll
out real thin and let slightly dry;
cut into strips, roll up and cut
fine, let dry real well; will keep
some time.

Suet Pudding

One cup sugar, 2 cups suet, 1
cup bread crumbs, 2 cups raisins, 2
cups currants, 1 tablespoon molasses,
1 cup sour milk, 1 teaspoon cin-
namon, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1 tea-
spoon allspice, 1 teaspoon soda,
enough flour to make real stiff and
bake 2 hours. Sauce—2 cups water,
2 cups sugar, 2 eggs, 2 tablespoons
flour, butter and flavoring.
