RANCHERS ENTHUSIASTIC OVER CANNERY

An enthusiastic crowd of fruit better prices for their crops and day at the I. O. O. F. hall at Beaverton. About 150 were present.
The principal speaker was Mr. Kipp, Market master of the chamber of Portland, who spoke at some length on the advantage of producers organizing so as to secure better prices for their crops and also tried to find out the acreage that could be signed up for a cannery if it should be located in Beaverton.

He spoke of several places in the state where better prices for produce was obtained by organizing and urged those present to at least form an organization.

Mr. Bartlett of Scholls stated that a number of ranchers in his section had organized four years ago and dried their black caps. The first year they secured 25c a lb; second year 35c; and the third year 50c a pound. There are now 40 members and they have 50 acres in black caps. One hundred and fifty reports on crops were turned in to the secretary covering about 200 acres that would be available for a cannery.

The girls glee club of the high school sang several numbers and Mrs. Barnes sang a solo. The names of all present were taken and the meeting adjourned to meet January 24 at 1:30 p. m. when Mr. Kipp would again be present.
