RECIPES

Cinnamon Toast

1 slice bread, 1 tablespoon butter, 1
tablespoon sugar, ¼ teaspoon cinnam-
on; mix ingredients and spread on
bread; toast until golden brown.

This is nice to serve when unex-
pected guests drop in Sunday eve-
ning.

Rice Muffins

One cup boiled rice, 1 cup sweet
milk, 2 eggs, 5 tablespoons melted
butter, 1½ teaspoons salt, 1 table-
spoon sugar, 3 teaspoons baking
powder, 1½ cups flour; this makes
12 muffins.

Meat Pie

One cup coarsely chopped left over
meat, 1 small onion, 1 medium sized
potato, salt and pepper, boiling
water; crust: 1 cup flour, ¼ tea-
spoon salt, 2 teaspoons baking
powder, 1 tablespoon lard, enough
milk to make soft dough; oil the
bottom and sides of a baking dish
with bacon fat; cut onion in half
and put in center of dish; add
potato thinly sliced; add meat sea-
soned with salt and pepper, sprinkle
with flour, and pour in boiling
water at one side of the dish to
more than cover contents; cover
with crust and bake ½ hour in a
moderate oven.

Asparagus Cream Omelet

Stir 1 heaping tablespoon of butter
and same amount of flour together;
set the saucepan over fire and when
well blended, add 1 cup of milk,
stir until smooth, add a teaspoon
of chopped parsley, remove from the
fire and cool; beat 3 eggs separately,
the whites to a stiff froth; add the
yolks to the cold sauce with a tea-
spoon of salt and a dash of cayenne;
add also 1 cup of cooked asparagus
tips and the stiffly beaten whites,
put a tablespoon of butter in a hot
frying pan; when it is brown pour
in the mixture, break it in places
with a fork to allow the uncooked
portions to run down; when it is
set, place in a hot oven for five
minutes, double over and serve.

Brown Betty

Three slices of dry bread, a bowl
of pared and sliced apples, butter
bread and place in pudding dish;
cover with apples, sprinkle with
sugar and cinnamon and dot with

butter; repeat, having bread on top,
covered with sugar and cinnamon;
add ½ cup hot water and bake 20
minutes.

Dressing for Same—1 cup sugar, 1
tablespoon butter, dash of salt, 2
cups hot water, 1 teaspoon vanilla;
thicken with 1 tablespoon flour or
cornstarch. Cook until slightly thick.

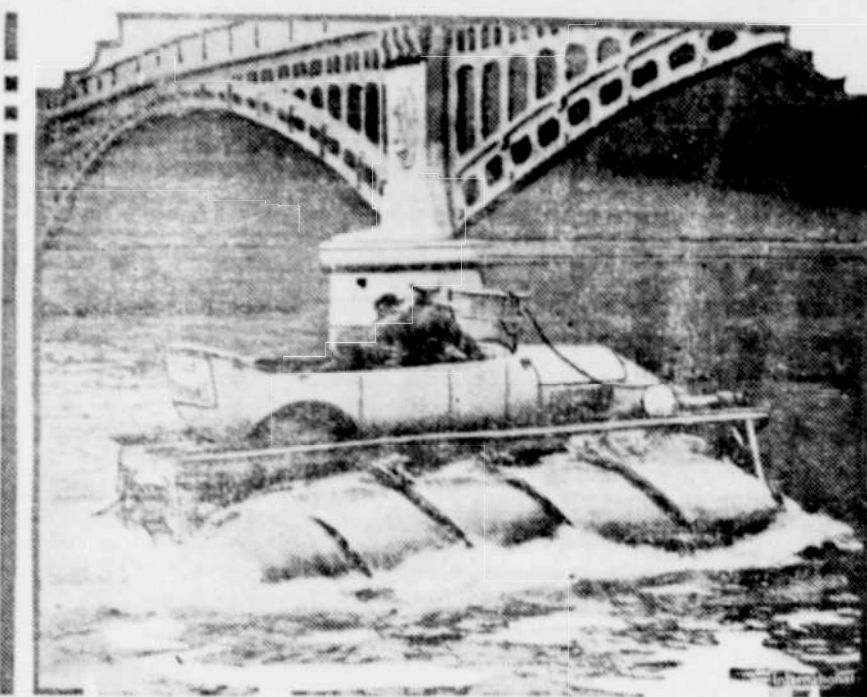

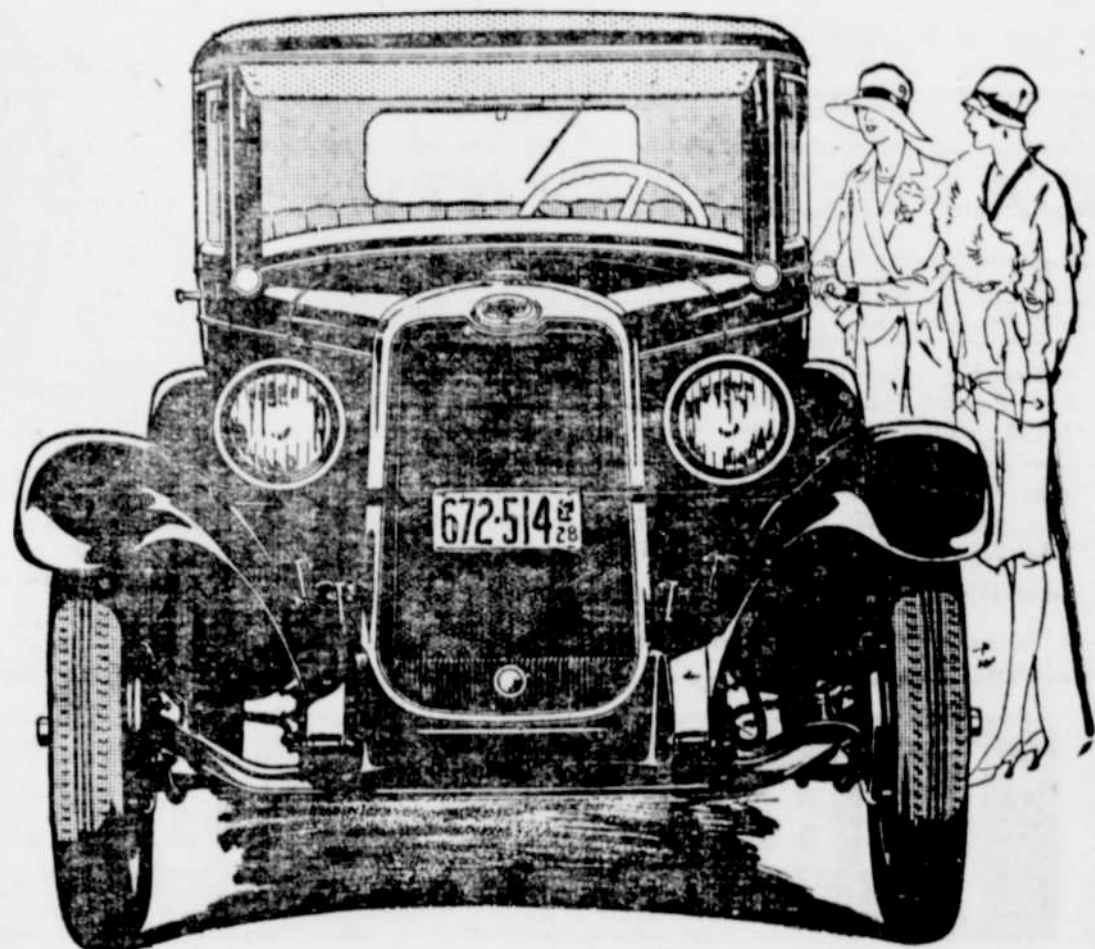
