Roy Glatt, of Woodburn, secretary of the cooperative bargaining association there, was present and told how they had started out seven years ago with 20 members and 30 acres and now there were 267 members with 600 acres planted. He explained the methods they had used, of how they advised the members as to the best crops to plant so as not to overload the market and also told how they marketed their crops. Numerous questions were asked him, showing that ranchers here were taking an intense interest in the new way to sell their crops.
