## RECIPES

**Baked Weiners**  
One pound weiners, 1½ cups tomato juice seasoned with ½ teaspoon sugar, ¼ teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon flour, dissolved in a little water, pinch of pepper, 1 finely chopped onion, place in deep pan and bake in hot oven about 30 min.

**Stuffed Spanish Onions**  
Peel the onions under water and scoop out from the top a portion of the center; par-boil 5 minutes and turn upside down to drain; make a stuffing of the chopped onion taken from the centers, softened bread crumbs, salt, pepper and a generous amount of butter. Fill the onions heaping full and sprinkle the top with buttered crumbs. Cover and cook until tender (about an hour), in a pan containing a small quantity of water. Let them brown a very little before taking from the oven.

**Banana Salad**  
This salad is wholesome and quickly made; split bananas in quarters lengthwise and lay on shredded lettuce; sprinkle with chopped nut meats and serve with French dressing; chilled bananas arranged in this way with chopped walnuts, served with whipped cream, make a wholesome dessert to serve with a light dinner.

**Carmel Pie**  
Bake a rich pie crust and then fill with the following custard: 4 cup sweet milk, 1 cup brown sugar, 2 egg yolks well beaten, 2 heaping tablespoons flour, butter size of egg, vanilla flavoring, cook custard in double boiler until thick, then pour in baked crust; make meringue of whites and brown slightly in oven or to save gas, under jet while cooking a meal.

**Picnic Cake**  
One-half cup shortening, ¾ cup sugar, cream together, 4 egg yolks beaten light and ¾ cup sugar, beaten together; mix above mixtures together; sift 3 cups cake flour, measure, add 4 teaspoons baking powder, ¼ teaspoon salt, sift 3 times; add flour and 1 cup milk alternately to mixture, 1 teaspoon vanilla, fold in 4 stiffly beaten egg whites, bake in layers.

**Home Made Bluing**  
Dissolve 1 ounce of Prussian blue in 5 quarts of cold water, also ½ ounce of oxalic acid in a pint of water; when the acid is thoroughly dissolved mix it with the Prussian blue; strain through a piece of muslin into a bottle. This makes an excellent bluing and costs about one-tenth of that you buy. Makes clothes very white.
