It took eight years to produce these films; over two million dollars were spent in production. Every costume, set and article is true to fact proved and reproved by hundreds of research experts. Every event pictured is absolutely authentic and correct, vouched for by famous authorities. The first unit of these chronicles is Columbus, Jamestown, The Pilgrims, The Puritans and Peter Stuyvesant. "Jamestown" will be shown at the Beaver Theater Friday, April 6, at 3:00 p. m. 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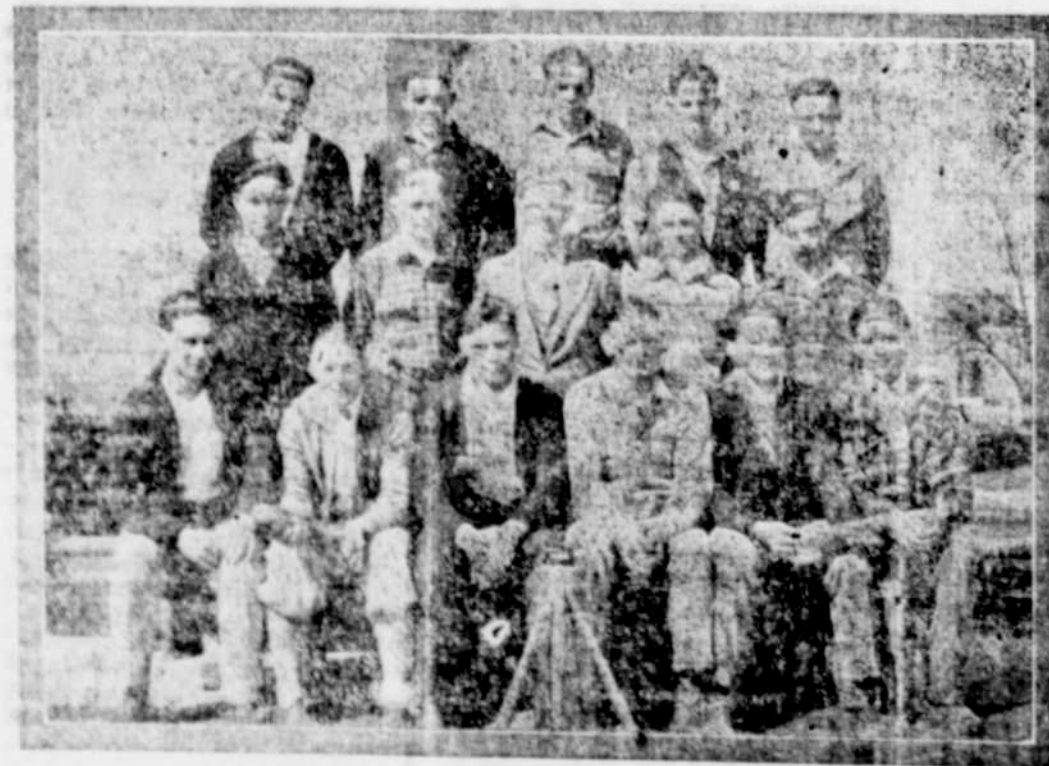
