#### FARM REMINDERS

An occasional soft shelled egg may mean little or nothing about the flock but if the condition becomes general a lack of calcium in the diet is indicated. Most successful poultrymen keep oyster shell before the chickens at all times. Mineral may also be added to the mash by mixing together 5 pounds bone meal, 2 pounds oyster shell flour or ground limestone, and 1 pound of table salt. Two or three pounds of this are added to each 100 pounds of mash, says the experimenter.

Alsike clover when grown for seed usually gives best results if the first growth is allowed to develop for seed purposes, as the second growth is not vigorous. Detrimental effects have resulted from pasturing back and clipping. Red clover, on the other hand, usually fills better if it is pastured back or clipped in sections where the growing season is long enough to mature the second crop.

One hundred and eighty-six carloads of sweet potatoes were unloaded at Portland in 1926 and 210 in 1927, according to official reports. This large tonnage came in mostly from California with a few cars from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana. A few farmers are growing sweet potatoes successfully in the vicinity of Hermiston. Irrigated soils of that section which are warm and mellow produce excellent yields of these roots. Co-operative experiments carried out in Josephine and Malheur counties by the Oregon station show that some of the warm irrigated soils in that region are well suited to sweet potato production. Leading varieties include the Yellow Strassburg, Triumph and Porto Rico.

#### HAL HOSS MAKES FORMAL ANNOUNCEMENT FOR OFFICE

Oregon City, Ore., April 12—Hal E. Hoss of Oregon City, who announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination as secretary of state two weeks ago, filed his formal declaration for the office with the secretary of state's office Monday. Mr. Hoss will use as his slogan on the ballot at the primary election, May 18, "Trained in business and state administration; endorsed by 121 newspapers; efficient service."

Mr. Hoss, who recently resigned as private secretary to Governor L. L. Patterson, has his campaign headquarters at Oregon City, where he was manager of the Oregon City Enterprise for seven years prior to serving in an official capacity for the state.

Incorporated with his filing declaration, Mr. Hoss made the following pledge:

"I nominated and elected I will during my term of office give to the people of the state of Oregon an efficient and economical administration of their affairs, so far as they would come under my jurisdiction. I would make an earnest effort to aid in the development and utilization of our natural resources and local manufacturing business by urging that state business go to Oregon producers and Oregon firms whenever possible. I would consider myself at the service of the public and would love the people."
