Editorial exasperation is sometimes the result of so many "days" and "weeks" of special observance by a considerable number of people or classes of people. Some of these special occasions, however worthy, arise from selfish motives, or are the work of propagandists. Everybody knows that, or should know it. But a selfish motive often works to the advantage of more people than the circle of movers.

We can see no impure motive behind Mother's Day, which is usually scheduled for the second Sunday in May. To say that the flowers the florists sell, or the candy the confectioners sell, render this event in the class of the commercialized is small argument. The day needs no defense because mother doesn't. In truth, commercialism as such, needs no defense. More power to the high-pressure flower and candy salesmen for Mother's Day. A merchant who induces a son or daughter to send a remembrance to mother is doing good and is worthy of his hire.

There is a definite reason for Mother's Day even in sentiment alone. It makes lazy editors dig in and write sweet things. It makes wayward children write letters. It causes poets to sing and muses to muse. Indeed, without Mother's Day, or a spiritual prod of equivalent force, the writer would not be writing, nor the printer printing nor the reader reading.

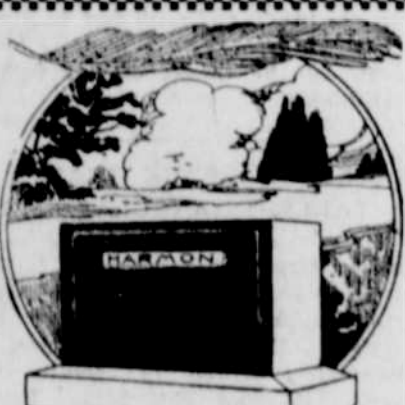
Then there is something in Mother's Day—a world of blessing in a mother; a great debt to be paid.

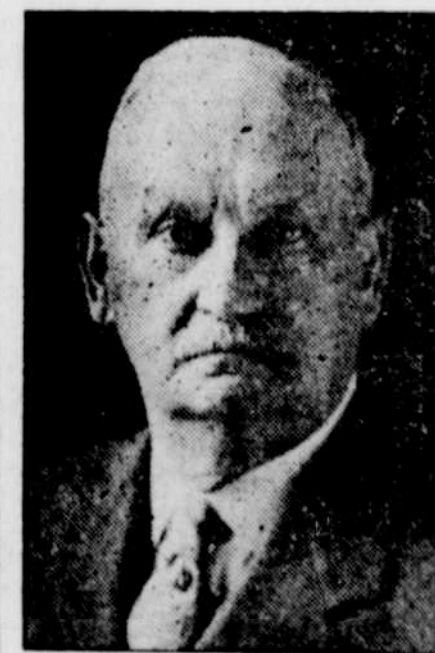

SALES OF STAR CARS FORCE MAKERS TO EXPAND PLANT

A contract for a \$750,000 extension to the Lansing, Mich., Durant plant was recently placed by Durant Motors, Inc., according to word received by Norman De Vaux, general manager of the Pacific Coast Durant factory. This extension was necessitated by the huge file of orders for Durant cars in the east, and it will increase the capacity of the Lansing plant to 1,000 cars a day.

The advice states that work on the extension will begin immediately and that the plant will be in full operation by August 1. At present the machine shops of the Lansing plant are working on a 24-hour schedule machining the malleable castings and forgings for use in the factory here and the Durant factory in Elizabeth, N. J.

Chicago, Ill., registration figures show that the Durant-Star scored the largest percentage of gain for the first quarter of 1928 of any car selling there. Durant-Star gained 16 per cent over the corresponding period of 1927. The increase is partially attributed to the introduction at show time of the Durant sixes.
