FIRST PRIZE IN RABBITRY WON BY FRANK SHEPHERD

The Rabbitry club of the Aloha-Huber school completed its work with an exhibit at the school on Achievement day, May 24. There was a good sized club this year, as most children are interested in rabbits, if only as pets. The work of the club included detailed study of housing, feeding and care of rabbits, pointing also to the quality of stock necessary to produce results commercially. Each boy was evidently proud of his particular exhibit.

White and Black Flemish, New Zealand Red, Chinchilla, Blue Beaver and Angoras were exhibited. The judge explained to each entrant where the superior merit lay, and where improvement could be made. The first prize was won by Frank Shepherd with an 11 months old White Flemish doe and her six weeks old litter. Gordon Coward won second prize with his Chinchilla doe. Third place was awarded to Robert Teschner's exhibit of a Black Flemish doe and New Zealand Red buck. STREETS TO BE NAMED AND MARKERS ERECTED

RESIDENTS TO DECIDE NAMES

Chart Will be Made of District and Given to County Assessor for Permanent Record

Should you happen to live in the Huber-Aloha community you will shortly have the privilege of selecting the street which shall run past your door. Won't that be fine! No; no moving is necessary, just pick out the name you want and providing your next door neighbor agrees with you, you shall all live on that avenue. Turn in the name to the Huber Commercial club and they will erect a marker right down at the corner. We'll say you may live on your own sweet avenue and the sign will tell the world where you live.

Such is a recent movement sponsored by the local organization. All streets and avenues are to be marked on every corner. A name will be given every street, avenue, or lane which now has none. The territory to be marked will extend from Archer station east of Huber to Tobias station west of Aloha. All of this territory will be covered by degrees, according to the plans of this organization. The club will take care of the Huber vicinity and is inviting the co-operation of the other districts in getting their streets marked. Residents on all un-named streets are encouraged to get their faculties busy; pick out a name and turn it in.

Records at the county seat have been checked and it has been found that many of the roads now existing have no names. Others which have had certain names attached to them by the residents have not those names on record at the county offices at Hillsboro. So if your street doesn't suit you change it. Inquire of the Huber Commercial club whose address is Huber, Oregon whether your street has a name. It may be in need of one. This club will be glad to receive inquiries and will co-operate with everyone in getting a good name for all unnamed roads and will see that such names are posted thereon. After all names have been decided on and a chart of the community has been finished it will be turned in at the county assessors office for permanent references.

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
