HIGHWAY CONDITIONS

Newport to Hebo

Macadamized highway in excellent condition.

The following is the Present Status of Our Road Oiling Program

Columbia River Highway
Oiling operations are under way between Irrigon and Umatilla. Spreading top course of heavy oil which is immediately covered with screenings.

One way traffic under direction of flagmen is maintained for distance not to exceed one mile where oil is spread. Slight delay to traveling public account one way traffic, but cars are not required to travel on fresh of Old Oregon Trail.

Oiling operations will be under way during the coming week between Union and North Powder. No detours. One way traffic.

Mt. Hood Highway

Oiling operations are under way between Hood River and Forest Boundary. Detours are available as far as Parkdale with one way traffic beyond that point. Bituminous macadam construction will be under way during the coming week between Zigzag and Sandy. One way traffic will be provided for.

Oiling operations are under way between Swim and Wapinitia road and the road is closed east of Wapinitia road.

Corvallis-Newport Highway

There is fresh oil on this road from the foot of Kline's Mountain to Eddyville. Motorists should be warned to drive carefully at moderate speed. Oiling operations will be under way during the coming week between Toledo and Newport. No detours. One way traffic.

McMinnville-Tillamook Highway

Bituminous macadam construction is under way between Grand Ronde and Hebo. One way traffic.

Rosevelt Highway (U. S. No. 101)

Astoria to Seaside, paved. Seaside to Mohler, macadam. Mohler-Miami, highway route via Wheeler, Brighton, Lake Lytle, Rockaway and Barview. Barview to Garibaldi under construction but open to travel from each end. Through travel between Mohler and Garibaldi, advised to take inside or Foley Creek route which is gravelled throughout. Miami, Tillamook, Hebo, Neskevin, Devils Lake, Siletz River, Otter Rock, Newport, macadam.

The highway is not constructed between Newport, Waldport and Yaquina but it is possible to get through via a beach road at low tide. No road between Yaquina and Florence. Just a trail between Florence and Reedsport. Reedsport to Lakeside, under construction. Lakeside to North Bend-Marshfield-Coquille-Bandon-Gold Beach-State line, paved from North Bend to Coquille; balance excellent macadam road. Free Ferry to North Bend. Rogue River Ferry at Gold Beach, free from 6:30 a. m. to 10 p. m. after which the old ferry is used and on which there is a charge of 75c a car.
