PACIFIC STAGES ANNOUNCE NEW RATES AND SCHEDULES

Pacific Stages makes the announcement that effective June 25th, their schedules will be altered in the following manner:

Schedule that formerly left Forest Grove at 6:35 a. m., will leave at 6:13 a. m., and on Sunday night, a new schedule will be inaugurated leaving Forest Grove at 7:15 p. m. This schedule is to handle the week-end trade and will be run Sunday night only.

To McMinnville by way of Newberg, a new schedule will be added, leaving Portland at 5:20 p. m. This will make the departure time from Portland to McMinnville by way of Newberg hourly from 4 p. m. to 6 p. m.

In addition to the above changes, Pacific Stages announce the adoption of a 50-ride commuter ticket book. This book is good for 50 trips between the points sold when presented for transportation by the purchaser. This new style book must be used in 31 days. It is designed to give a very low fare to the commuter living outside of Portland and working in Portland who must make daily trips to and from his work. The rate is very low, as for instance, the rate from Beaverton is \$6.60 for 50 rides which is 13.2 cent per ride. Other points enjoy equally low rates.

In addition to the 50-ride book, the new tariff filed by Pacific Stages makes several reductions in the 10-ride book as applied between stations. The 10-ride book has been very popular inasmuch as the fare is very low and the tickets are bearer tickets; that is, good for anyone presenting them. In this respect, the 10-ride book differs from the 50-ride book because with the 50-ride book, the tickets must be presented with the cover and are only good for the transportation of the purchaser of the book, and must be used in the 31 day period, while the 10-ride book is good for 60 days.
