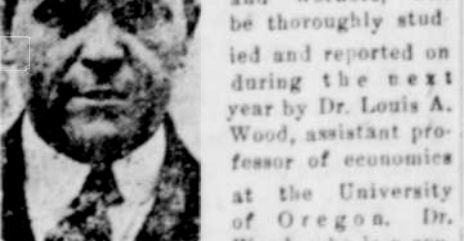

Railroad Study Due

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene.—"The Union-Management Cooperation on the Railroads," or what is commonly called the "B. and O." plan of industrial relations between railway operators and workers, will be thoroughly studied and reported on during the next year by Dr. Louis A. Wood, assistant professor of economics at the University of Oregon. Dr. Wood, who is a specialist on labor problems, has been granted a Sterling Research fellowship in the graduate school of Yale University for the year 1928 and 1929, and will devote all his time to the study of the railway project.

The study will receive cooperation from the federal department of labor of the United States, and officials of the American Federation of Labor are also expected to be interested.

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FARM REMINDERS

Low-grade alfalfa hay is often though is of course not practical under field corn conditions. caused by baling undercured hay direct from the cocks or windrows and then loading directly into cars. An equally poor practice in some parts of Oregon is overdrying with resultant shattering of leaves, finds the experiment station.

No advantage is gained on most Oregon soils by continued cultivation of corn, potatoes and similar crops after weeds have been brought under good control. Cultivation merely for the sake of stirring the soil has not been found profitable except under extreme conditions, report farm crop specialists.

Equal parts of calcium arsenate and sulphur or wood ashes applied to the green silk will control the corn ear worm in Oregon, says the experiment station. The dust is applied with a hand bellows every eight days until the silk dries up. This method is good for sweet corn, pop corn or valuable seed plots.

Diseased potato plants pulled out and dropped in the field had better not be pulled at all as the disease-spreading insects leave at once and infect new plants. The method used by successful Oregon growers of certified potatoes is to carry the plants outside the field and bury or destroy them.

Many farm gardens in Oregon will repay in increased yield and quality the time and money necessary to give them supplemental irrigation. Small pumping plants or gravity systems are coming into more wide use each year, college extension specialists find.
